Course content is determined by the honors seminar instructor and the foundation course instructors to complement, enhance and support the theme of the seminar or the research topics of students. Content of the research seminar can thus consider conceptual and methodological issues raised by the specific research topics considered. Students are expected to show a mastery of the theoretical, methodological and/or artistic questions associated with their research topic (often by giving at least one public presentation of their topic, with opportunity for questions), and the course content is to be designed to help honors students attain this mastery.

Instruction includes lectures, discussion, in-class exercises, group activities, and screenings. Library visits and other out of class academic and research activities. Students may write journals, annotated bibliographies, short papers, proposals, drafts final essays or document their work in a discipline appropriate manner. Students complete and present an honors project appropriate to the companion foundation course. Projects may involve experiments; advanced problem-solving; critical analyses; design and development of devices, software, or processes; literature reviews. Final project may be presented in a variety of media.
