#### **Catalog Description:**

Advanced practice of methods to increase comprehension, vocabulary, critical reading, study-reading strategies, and/or speed using college-level reading material. May include internet, computer-assisted, and/or DVD assignments. Uses self-paced programs based on diagnostic tests to meet specific student needs. Students may enroll any time through the twelfth week of the semester.
