(Units do not apply toward AA/AS degree.)

Various lower-level introductory-to-college level reading materials in which students practice various reading strategies to increase reading comprehension skills. Students will identify topic and main idea in lower-level introductory-to college level reading materials. Students wil practice increasing their reading rate.
