Bill Number and Title: H.R.540 -- Energy Efficient Government Technology Act

Sponsor(s): Rep Eshoo, Anna G.

Cosponsor(s) in Northern California (10 max): Rep Lofgren, Zoe

Purpose: To amend the National Energy Conservation Policy Act and the Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007 to promote energy efficiency via information and computing technologies, and for other purposes.

Group(s) Impacted:

Fiscal Impact (if applicable): None.

Last Action: 2/6/2013 Referred to House committee.

Current Status: Referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

Description: `(1) IN GENERAL- Not later than 1 year after the date of enactment of this subsection, each Federal agency shall collaborate with the Director of the Office of Management and Budget (referred to in this subsection as the `Director') to develop an implementation strategy (including best-practices and measurement and verification techniques) for the maintenance, purchase, and use by the Federal agency of energy-efficient and energy-saving information and communications technologies and practices. Each implementation strategy shall be flexible, cost-effective, and based on the specific operating requirements and statutory mission of the agency.

- `(2) ADMINISTRATION- In developing an implementation strategy, each Federal agency shall--
 - `(A) consider information and communications technologies (ICT) and related infrastructure and practices, such as--
 - `(i) advanced metering infrastructure;
 - `(ii) ICT services and products;
 - `(iii) efficient data center strategies and methods of increasing ICT asset and related infrastructure utilization;
 - `(iv) ICT and related infrastructure power management;
 - `(v) building information modeling, including building energy management; and
 - '(vi) secure telework and travel substitution tools; and

ASCSM Bill Report and Summary

Bill Number and Title: S. 50

"Strengthening Protections for Children and Communities From Disease Clusters Act"

Sponsor(s): Senator Barbara Boxer

Cosponsor(s) in Northern California (10 max):

Purpose: "(1) to provide to the Administrator the authority to help conduct investigations into the potential for environmental pollutants or toxic substances to cause disease clusters;

(2) to ensure that the Administrator has the authority to undertake actions to help address existing and potential environmental pollution and toxic substances that may contribute to the creation of disease clusters; and (3) to enable the Administrator to integrate and work in conjunction with other Federal, State, and local agencies, institutions of higher education, and the public in investigating and helping to address the possible causes of disease clusters."

Current Status: Read twice and referred to the Committee on Environment and Public Works.

Description: In general, the administrator along with the Administrator of the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry, the Secretary, and the Director, will develop, publish, and periodically update guidelines that describe a systematic and integrated approach that uses the best available sciences to investigate.

Bill Number and Title: H.R.537 -- Social Networking Online Protection Act

Sponsor(s): Rep Engel, Eliot L.

Cosponsor(s) in Northern California (10 max):

Purpose: To prohibit employers and certain other entities from requiring or requesting that employees and certain other individuals provide a user name, password, or other means for accessing a personal account on any social networking website.

Current Status: Referred to the House Committee on Education and the Workforce.

Description:

It shall be unlawful for any employer--

- (1) to require or request that an employee or applicant for employment provide the employer with a user name, password, or any other means for accessing a private email account of the employee or applicant or the personal account of the employee or applicant on any social networking website; or
- (2) to discharge, discipline, discriminate against in any manner, or deny employment or promotion to, or threaten to take any such action against, any employee or applicant for employment because--
 - (A) the employee or applicant for employment refuses or declines to provide a user name, password, or other means for accessing a private email account of the employee or applicant or the personal account of the employee or applicant on any social networking website; or
 - (B) such employee or applicant for employment has filed any complaint or instituted or caused to be instituted any proceeding under or related to this Act or has testified or is about to testify in any such proceeding.

The institution will not--

- '(i) require or request that a student or potential student provide the institution with a user name, password, or any other means for accessing a private email account of the student or potential student or the personal account of the student or potential student on any social networking website; or
- '(ii) discharge, discipline, discriminate against in any manner, or deny admission to, suspend, or expel, or threaten to take any such action against, any student or potential student because—

Bill Number and Title: H.R.430 -- Protect Our Military Trainees Act

Sponsor(s): Rep. Jackie Speier

Cosponsor(s) in Northern California (10 max):

Purpose: To amend the Uniform Code of Military Justice to protect new members of the Armed Forces who are undergoing basic training from the sexual advances of the members of the Armed Forces responsible for their instruction.

Group(s) Impacted: Anyone entering the military; military trainees.

Fiscal Impact (if applicable): None.

Last Action: 1/25/2013

Referred to the House Committee on Armed Services.

Current Status: Referred to the House Committee on Armed Services.

Description:

- (a) Prohibition- Section 920 of title 10, United States Code (article 120 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice), is amended--
 - (1) by redesignating subsections (e) through (g) as subsections (f) through
 - (h); respectively; and
 - (2) by inserting after subsection (d) the following new subsection (e):
- '(e) Sexual Acts and Sexual Contact Between Certain Military Instructors and Trainees-
 - '(1) ENHANCED SEXUAL ASSAULT PROHIBITION- A military instructor who commits a sexual act upon a member of the armed forces while the member is undergoing basic training (or its equivalent) or within 30 days after completing such training--
 - '(A) is guilty of sexual assault if the military instructor exercised any supervisory authority over the member during such training; and
 - '(B) shall be punished as a court-martial may direct.
 - '(2) ENHANCED ABUSIVE SEXUAL CONTACT PROHIBITION- A military instructor who commits or causes sexual contact upon or by a member of the armed forces while the member is undergoing basic training (or its equivalent) or within 30 days after completing such training--
 - '(A) is guilty of abusive sexual contact if the military instructor exercised any supervisory authority over the member during such training; and
 - '(B) shall be punished as a court-martial may direct.
 - `(3) COVERED MILITARY INSTRUCTORS- This subsection applies with respect to the following members of the armed forces otherwise subject to this chapter:
 - '(A) Drill Sergeants in the Army.
 - '(B) Drill Instructors in the Marine Corps.
 - `(C) Recruit Division Commanders in the Navy.
 - '(D) Military Training instructors in the Air Force.
 - '(E) Company Commanders in the Coast Guard.
