### APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Motion to approve the agenda as presented by Senator Riley; seconded by Senator Chettipally. Hearing no objections, the motion carried.

### APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF PRIOR MEETINGS

Motion to approve minutes of the Monday, Dec. 5, 2016, meeting as presented by Senator Topete Eng Goon, seconded by Senator Wang. Hearing no objections, the motion carried.

### ANNOUNCEMENTS AND HEARINGS OF THE PUBLIC

### REPORTS

**President Roe** welcomed members of the Senate back for the Spring 2017 semester. He also reported that the Senate has lost four members: Senators Maria (Lupe) Ramirez Serratos, Chak Haang (Vina) Wong, Alicia Chan, and Bella Hamzah. He is hoping to fill those positions today. Mr. Roe also stated that the Senate will review participatory governance committee appointments at the next meeting, so if anyone cannot still attend their committee meetings, they need to inform President Roe as soon as possible.

**Finance Director Kaffl** stated that he enjoyed the Winter Retreat. He also reported that he would still be able to attend all his participatory governance meetings this semester.

**Vice Chair McReynolds** reported that the first Inter Club Council meeting for the semester will take place on Wednesday, Feb. 1. He encouraged members of the Senate who are in clubs or know club members to have their groups submit their Continuing Club Packets to the Center for Student Life and Leadership Development as soon as possible.

**Programming Board Chair Chettipally** reported that the Programming Board will have its first meeting of the semester on Wednesday at 2:10 PM. In addition, the Reboot Week event will be next week, Tuesday, Jan. 31 through

Thursday, Feb. 2. He asked that members of the Senate and the boards look out for the volunteer sign-up sheet, which will be sent out via email.

**Student Life and Leadership Manager Schaefer** welcomed the Senate back for the spring semester. He encouraged members of the Senate to give their full support to the Programming Board and Reboot Week. He reminded the group that Reboot Week will be an opportunity to recruit new members for the boards, and that these new recruits will most likely end up as members of the Senate next year. Mr. Schaefer also announced that the delegation for the Washington, DC advocacy trip has been selected. They are: President Roe, Senators Topete Eng Goon and Gomez, and Advocacy Board members Mondana Bathai, Jacob Abney, Nathan Storey, and Kristiana Wolf-Blake.

**Student Life and Leadership Assistant Fauzi Hamadeh** welcomed everyone back for the spring semester. He also encouraged members of the Senate to remember to please keep the ASCSM Office in Building 17 clean. Mr. Hamadeh reminded the group that eligibility checks for the spring semester will take place after the last day of the Add/Drop Period, which is Monday, Jan. 30. As a reminder, members of the Senate must be enrolled in at least 6 units of credit at CSM, have a cumulative GPA of 2.0 and a minimum GPA of 2.0 in their last semester, and must be in good academic standing (have a 50 percent or better completion rate). Finally, Mr. Hamadeh stated that the Student Public Safety Survey had concluded last Friday, Jan. 20, and that he will bring the results to the Senate for review and discussion.

Motion to approve by Senator Wang; seconded by Senator Gomez. By a vote of 12 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.
- Georgia Giari as a member of the Student Senate  
Motion to approve by Senator Chettipally; seconded by Senator Relos. By a vote of 13 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

## **APPROVAL OF ELECTIONS TIMELINES FOR STUDENT TRUSTEE NOMINEE ELECTION AND ASCSM SPRING 2017 GENERAL ELECTION**

Mr. Schaefer introduced the proposed timelines for the Student Trustee Nominee Election and the ASCSM General Election. According to District Policies and Procedures, the Student Trustee Nominee Election must take place no later than March 30. Each campus holds an election to select a nominee. Those nominees then meet with the District Student Council, which selects the Student Trustee for the next academic year. According to the proposed timeline, candidate filing will open Monday, Feb. 13; the mandatory candidates meeting will take place on Thursday, March 16; campaigning will begin Monday, March 20; polls will be open Tuesday, March 28 and Wednesday, March 29; and results will be announced Thursday, March 30.

Motion to approve the Student Trustee Nominee Election timeline by Senator Riley; seconded by Senator Chettipally. By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

The ASCSM General Election will be to fill seats for the 2017/18 student government. All positions will be available, including President, Vice President, Finance Director, and Senators. According to the proposed timeline, candidate filing will open Monday, April 10; the mandatory candidates meeting will take place on Thursday, April 20; campaigning will begin Monday, April 24; polls will be open between Tuesday, May 2 and Thursday, May 4; and results will be available on Friday, May 5 and/or Monday, May 8, depending on availability of Student Life staff and the Election Commission.

Motion to approve the ASCSM Spring 2017 General Election timeline by Senator Wolf-Blake; seconded by Vice Chair McReynolds. By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

## **FUNDING TO ATTEND AMERICAN STUDENT ASSOCIATION OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES NATIONAL ADVOCACY CONFERENCE**

Mr. Schaefer introduced the item, stating that the Senate has traditionally sent a delegation to the United States Student Association annual conference in Washington, DC. However, as of last check, USSA had not posted any information about this year's conference on the group's website. Therefore, the Advocacy Board is proposing to attend the American Student Association of Community Colleges National Advocacy Conference. The conference will be held between March 11 and March 14. Expenses will be slightly higher for this conference due to additional local travel and increased registration costs.

Motion to approve allocating \$15,000.00 from the Student Representation Fee trust account to send a delegation to the ASACC National Advocacy Conference by Senator Riley; seconded by Senator Storey. By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

## **REVIEW OF ASCSM GOALS AND ACTION STEPS FOR 2016/17**

President Roe and Mr. Hamadeh led the Senate through a review of the group's goals and action steps for the academic year.

### ***Goal #1: Increase collaboration and insure greater communication among the Advocacy Board, the Cultural Awareness Board, the Programming Board, and the Student Senate.***

*Action Step #1: Board chairs should provide updates at Senate and Executive Cabinet in order to provide greater awareness of events and activities.*

The group felt this action step has been fulfilled and should continue.

*Action Step #2: Boards should increase the scope of their events in order to incorporate other groups.*

The group felt that there is room for improvement on this goal. The Burmese Light Festival held during Fall 2016 is a good example of an event that involved multiple groups. There was a suggestion to focus on collaborations with the Ambassadors, the Learning Communities, and the Clubs. The Our Voices event was another example, but may not have been fully realized. There was also a reminder that culture doesn't only include ethnicity.

*Action Step #3: Board Chairs should make attempts to sit in on meetings of the other Boards.*

This can be challenging due to class and personal schedules. Board Chairs will make an attempt to find opportunities to collaborate more, with a special emphasis on how to integrate Advocacy Board into Cultural Awareness and Programming Board events.

*Action Step #4: Hold a mixer for Board members and the members of the Senate.*

The mixer was held in Fall 2016 and was very successful. Several members of the Senate who were part of the Boards praised the event as an opportunity to learn about the Senators and get to know them. There was interest in the possibility of hold an event at the end of the semester to reward board members for their work.

***Goal #2: Increase outreach, communication, and collaboration with campus learning communities, such as EOPS, Mana, Puente, and Umoja.***

*Action Step #1: Hold a joint event between student government and the learning communities prior to the closing of Building 17 for construction.*

Mr. Hamadeh stated that he and Mr. Schaefer have a meeting scheduled later this week to talk about the timeline and other details for moving out of Building 17 in preparation for the remodel of the building. After we have more concrete information about when we will be moving, we can begin to plan the event.

*Action Step #2: Designate liaisons between the Senate and the learning communities.*

Not completed. Mr. Hamadeh stated that he and Mr. Schaefer may do some outreach to the Learning Communities coordinators to help facilitate.

*Action Step #3: Conduct outreach to the learning communities.*

Same status as Goal #2, Action Step #2.

***Goal #3: Provide greater support for club activities both on and off campus through Senate involvement.***

*Action Step #1: Members of the Senate who are in clubs should make announcements of club events at the Senate meeting.*

The group felt this action step has been fulfilled.

*Action Step #2: Members of the Senate should make a commitment to attend club-sponsored events.*

The group felt there has been good communication about club events, and that the Senate knows about them due to the funding requests that come before the group. It was suggested that Senators should make an effort to “drop in” at events that are taking place in the quad.

***Goal #4: Enhance the marketing and branding of ASCSM through various means.***

*Action Step #1: Increase the use of social media such as Facebook and Snapchat to promote events and engage students.*

There has been more activity on social media, especially on Facebook and Instagram. Snapchat proved to be a tough fit for the Senate’s purposes, so it has not seen as much activity.

*Action Step #2: Develop an ASCSM newsletter.*

The Center for Student Life needs to work with the Publicity Commissioner to develop a system for developing and providing content, such as upcoming events, etc.

*Action Step #3: Ensure that events, programs, and groups receiving ASCSM funding highlight student government support on their promotional materials.*

The group felt that it needs to be more proactive in making this happen. Announcements will be made to the clubs at ICC meetings to remind them of this requirement.

***Goals #5: Strengthen outreach to promote the goals, the mission, and the role of the Associated Students.***

*Action Step #1: Educate members of the Boards so they can help students understand the role of ASCSM on campus.*

The group felt this action step has been fulfilled. The mixer was a good example and opportunity.

*Action Step #2: Develop/update the ASCSM brochure.*

Mr. Hamadeh will work with Commissioner of Publicity Chin and Marine Kazaryan, one of the Student Life student assistants, to update the brochure.

## **Establishment of Faculty Evaluation Recommendation Task Force**

To further accelerate this process, a committee of students have collectively composed a list of concrete demands in order to meet the needs and catalyze the growth of opportunities for all students in our communities. We, the students of the San Mateo County Community College District, expect to be included throughout the entirety of the process to evaluate and implement the demands presented. This is not only to be transparent, but to create community and strengthen our district. With a sense of urgency, we ask you to join us in this effort to ensure the protection and belonging of all members of our community, on and off campus.

**If we do nothing, then our stated commitments to defend our shared values of inclusion, justice, and humanity will reveal themselves to be empty promises.**

## SMCCCD Student Demands

1. **WE NEED FROM OUR DISTRICT** positive and immediate action to ensure the safety of our undocumented students who are currently protected under DACA and those who aren't, through the following measures:
  - a. Make all three SMCCCD colleges sanctuary campuses.
    - i. In doing so, the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) cannot arrest, interview, or search students on the basis of immigration status. Every student has the right to an education free of fear.
    - ii. More specific information about sanctuary campuses can be found at: <http://tinyurl.com/guqbqom>
  - b. DREAMers centers and free legal clinics (such as Sparkpoint at Cañada and Skyline) at all campuses to provide undocumented students and their families legal advice, counseling, and other services.
2. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** to strive for complete transparency and equity across all three campuses.
  - a. Students from all three campuses should have the ability to communicate and be fully knowledgeable of the resources, programs, associated students (AS), academic courses, public safety, and other entities that are on their campus and sister campuses.
    - i. Information must be easily accessible for students and members of the community to understand the function of each campus and their components.
    - ii. Information regarding appropriation of funds and fiscal capacity for on campus resources must be available to the public.
  - b. Student should not have to travel from their home campus to a sister campus in order to receive necessary resources. For the reason that the majority of these resources are intended for marginalized communities, lack of transportation is an issue that may arise. Thus, this problem must be confronted and resolved. These resources must be equitably distributed fiscally throughout the district.
    - i. A DREAMers center or similar legal clinic and resource center should exist on each campus to ensure the protection of our undocumented students. [REFER TO (1.b.)]
    - ii. The implementation or expansion of disability resource centers on all three campuses.
    - iii. The implementation or expansion of a Veteran's resource center to support those who worked in the armed forces.



- ii. *We need of our faculty to plan out alternative curriculums with focus on the experiences and contributions of historically marginalized groups and not solely that of the Eurocentric narrative.*
        - 1. *Whitewashing or failure to acknowledge and understand marginalized communities' oppression is unacceptable. Even if the class is centered around European or Anglo-American history, the implications of European/Anglo-American imperialism and influence throughout the globe should be reiterated as a root cause of instability and oppression throughout many regions and people.*
      - b. *Every student who enrolls at Skyline, CSM, and Canada must go through a cultural sensitivity and ally awareness workshop before registering for any class.*
        - i. *Any student who is already registered must complete this workshop before fall semester of 2017.*
5. ***WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES*** *to ensure the protection and expansion of Diversity Studies, including without limitation: LGBTQ+ Studies, Ethnic Studies, and Women and Gender Studies.*
- a. *At least 6 credits of Diversity Studies courses must be completed in order to be able to receive a degree/certificate or transfer to a UC/Private College/CSU.*
  - b. *The implementation of a general committee to advocate for an ethnic studies department which would span across all three sister campuses.*
    - i. *Although CSM has a larger student body, Skyline and Canada are also in need of capable ethnic studies programs to address social, political, and economical perspectives from different ethnic groups. It is necessary to develop a program which will focus on bringing forth the experiences, negative and positive, as well as the accomplishments and failures of marginalized groups.*
    - ii. *In order to expand the department, more funding for ethnic studies professors, programs, and curriculum development.*
6. ***WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES*** *to engage in efforts for housing assistance programs and homeless resources on each campus, especially for high-risk students.*
- a. *Due to the current housing crisis in the Bay Area, tools should be provided to students facing rent hikes, displacement, eviction, or homelessness.*
    - i. *Housing support in the form of legal assistance and exposure to available outside organizations that help families/individuals find or keep sustainable and affordable housing.*



7. **WE NEED OUR CAMPUSES** to extend and expand cultural community gatherings on our campuses for all races and ethnicities.
  - a. Creating more opportunities where all students can meet, greet, and share individual experiences with their peers across all campuses.
  - b. Have school-sponsored cultural awareness and diversity celebration events for marginalized communities.
    - i. This should be extended to all people regardless of race or ethnicity. These must be places for people to learn and understand others for who they are.
  
8. **WE NEED OUR CAMPUSES** to strive for the expansion of psychological services, specifically pertaining to counseling for hate crimes, LGBTQ+ issues, and other problems our most vulnerable students may encounter.
  - A. We need comprehensive training for mental health services that will be provided for all three colleges. Students of color and other marginalized students face economic and social hardships that contribute to higher rates of depression and other psychological problems. If counseling/psychological services were able to attend to the needs of students, there would be an increase in academic and social achievement. We should focus on training that would incorporate the experiences of historically marginalized groups.
  - B. In response to the increase in hate crimes, we need support and security from all campuses. In order for students to focus on studies, our psychological/physical needs must be obtainable through representation and proper instruction. This includes; ethnicity, religious affiliation, sex, and gender.
  - C. Mental health services for marginalized students should be emphasized through outreach, staff assistance, and effective communication. This could possibly be executed through a committee of faculty and student leaders.
  - D. Sexual assault and other title IX victims must have the necessary tools to receive psychological help in regards to their experience(s).
  
9. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** to have our Public Safety facilitate themselves in a more community oriented manner than a police oriented one.
  - a. No further arming of public safety.
    - i. This includes restricting the introduction of local police departments on all 3 campuses.
      1. The current social and structural interaction between armed officers and marginalized communities includes heightened tension that must be understood. The fears of our most vulnerable students

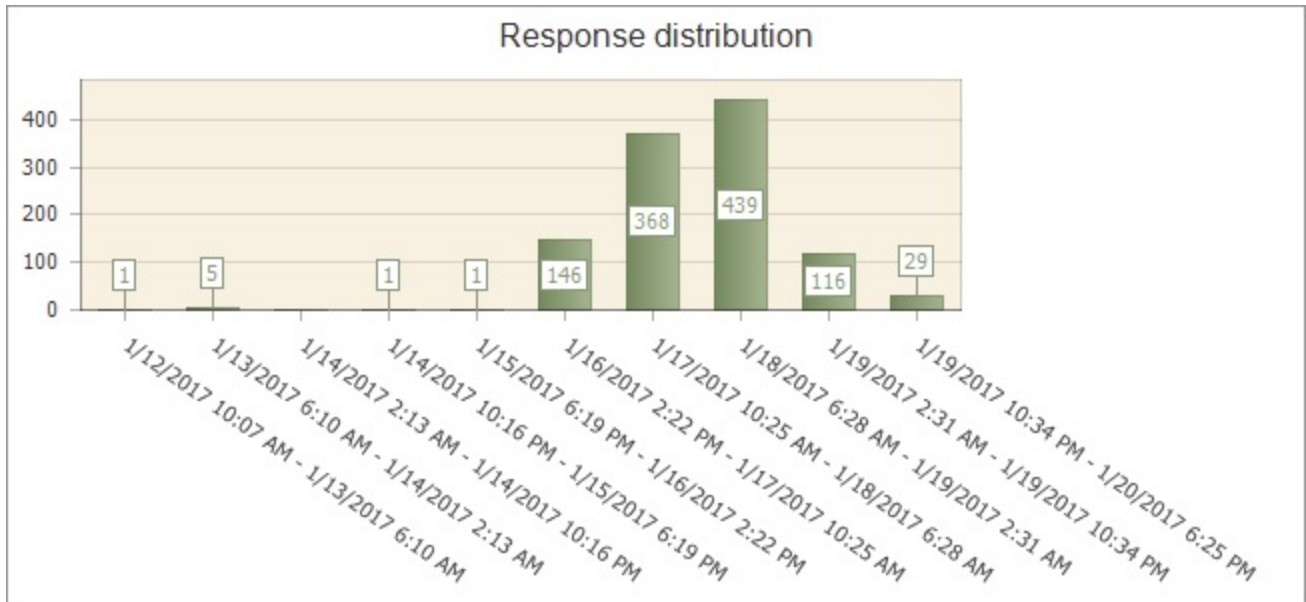
*regarding correctional officers must be respected and wholeheartedly communicated.*

- b. Conduct yearly evaluations on the Public Safety staff and trainings.
    - i. Have a public forum about perception of public safety officers each semester. This must be open and inclusive to all students and members of the SMCCCD community.**
  - c. Have a direct filing system for complaints against public safety that administrators have to evaluate.
    - i. The inclusion of students within this process is recommended in order to ensure proper procedure.**
  - d. Research must be conducted regarding the predatory ticketing job of public safety on all 3 campuses.
    - i. Giving tickets to students who lack parking passes is not a portion of safety. Thus, consideration of removing role should be an option.**
  - e. Thorough training on understanding the effects of implicit biases and the concerns of mass incarceration/police brutality in regards to social, political, and historical conditions must be presented on a semester basis to public safety and other similar positions.*
- 10. WE NEED OUR DISTRICT** *to comprise a specific board that includes a student senate member, a minimum of one administrator, one diversity faculty member (race and ethnicity studies, gender studies, etc.) and grievance/disciplinary board to hear students who report hate crimes.*
- a. Students of all background must be included in these processes in order to sustain an equitable decision making structure.*
- 11. WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** *to commit to addressing ongoing issues regarding environmental sustainability.*
- a. This includes the funding of educational programs on each campus.
    - i. The expansion of environmental sciences and sustainability efforts on campuses must be included.**
  - b. The entire district should consult San Mateo counties' new energy provider, Peninsula Clean Energy, in order to procure more renewable sources.*
- 12. WE NEED OUR DISTRICT** *to strive for free community college.*
- a. That all three colleges be free and accessible with the understanding that education is a right for the residents of San Mateo County.
    - i. The district should implement and support the proposal and make a tuition free college district.**

- ii. *Implement outreach programs for ex-felons and other similar potential students.*

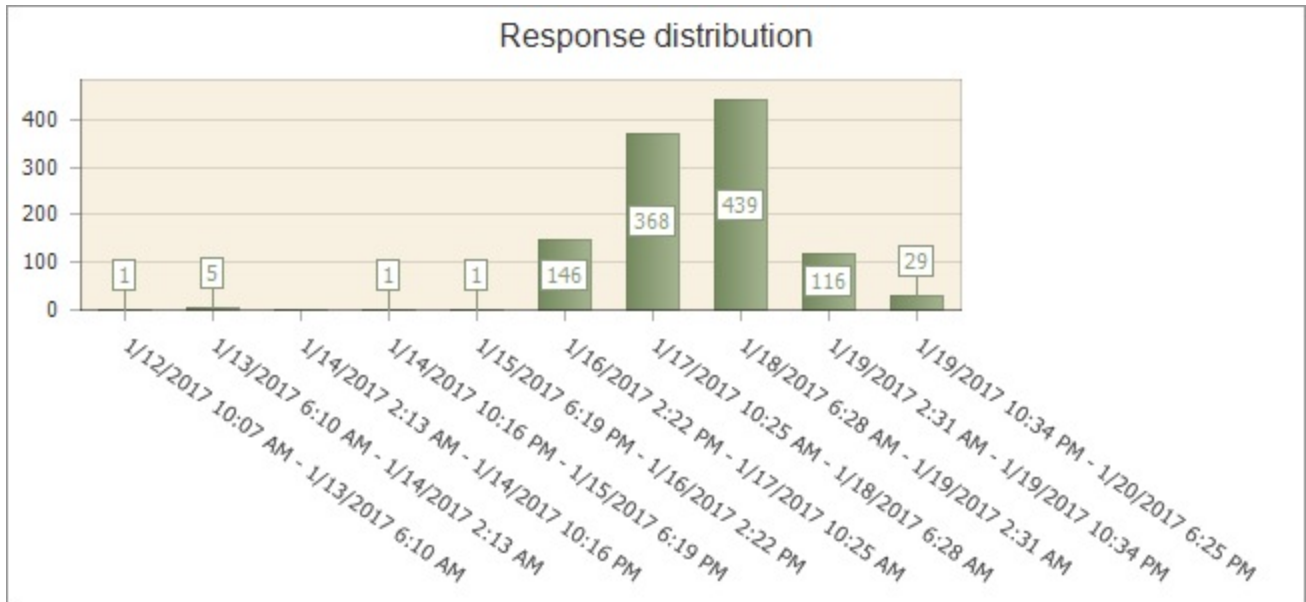

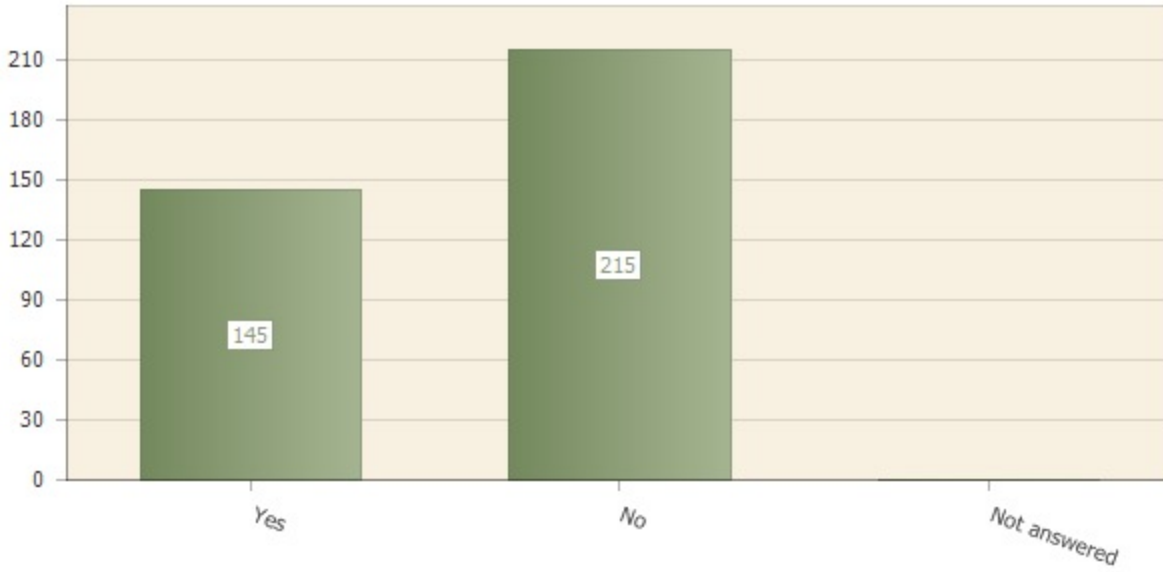

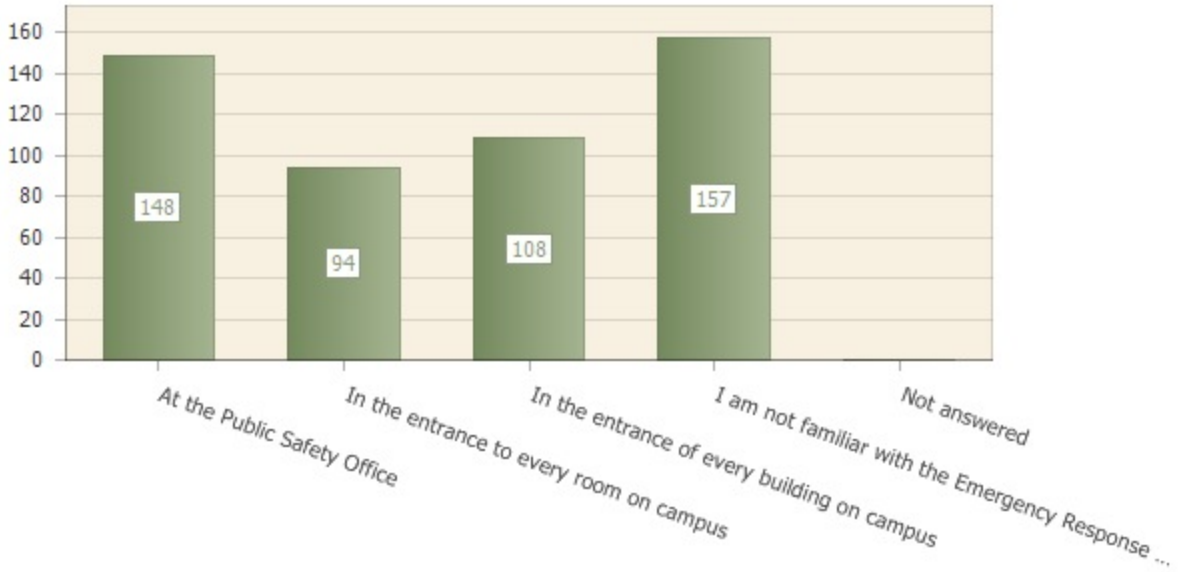

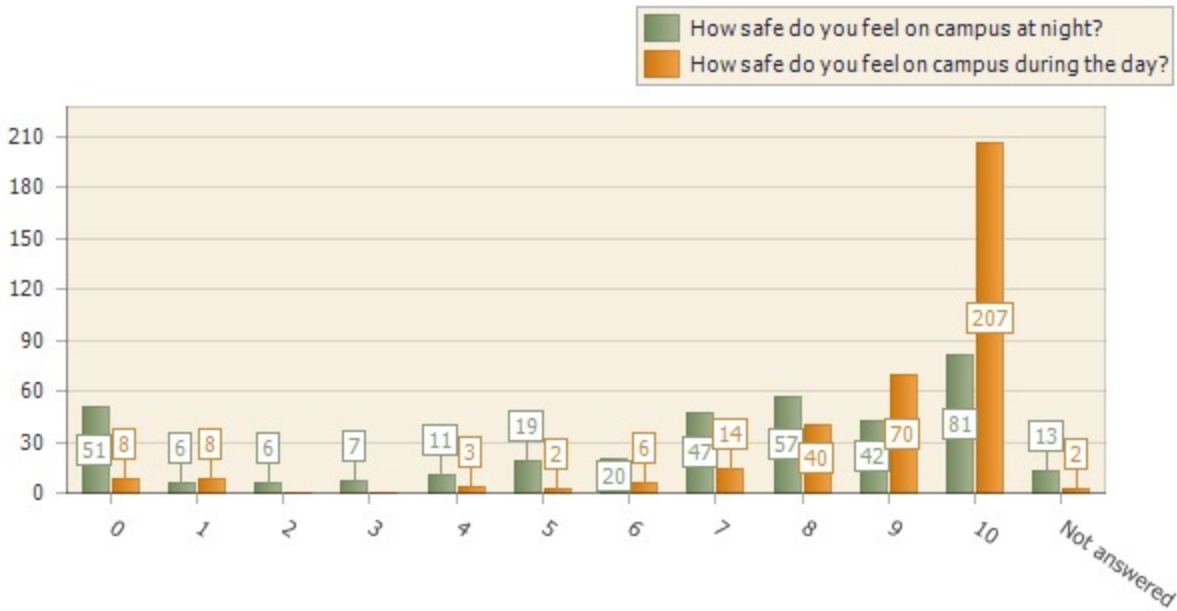
