Reboot Week Debrief



We, the students of San Mateo County Community College District, hold our elected student representatives, administrators, district employees, board of trustees, and chancellor accountable to protect and address the needs of our marginalized communities. This need has been exacerbated due to the 2016 presidential election, and the current political and social climate of the United States of America. The ideas of intolerance, xenophobia, and racism have become increasingly normalized. Deep rooted systemic and institutional social, political, economic, psychological, and spiritual oppression has been unveiled as an underlying issue within the fabric and foundation of the country. We expect unconditional transparency and involvement now, in the event that our freedoms and liberties are compromised. We are calling for the SMCCCD to protect the most vulnerable and marginalized members of our community from violations of their civil and human rights.

We, the students of the San Mateo County Community College District, understand and commend the efforts currently taking place to better the conditions of the most vulnerable communities on our campuses. To further accelerate this process, a committee of students have collectively composed a list of concrete demands in order to meet the needs and catalyze the growth of opportunities for all students in our communities. These changes may be perceived imminent or long term. However, we expect nothing less than what is presented.

We, the students of the San Mateo County Community College District, expect to be included throughout the entirety of the process to evaluate and implement the demands presented. This is not only to be transparent, but to create community and strengthen our district. With a sense of urgency, we ask you to join us in this effort to ensure the protection and belonging of all members of our community, on and off campus.

If we do nothing, then our stated commitments to defend our shared values of inclusion, justice, and humanity will reveal themselves to be empty promises.

SMCCCD Student Demands

- 1. **WE NEED FROM OUR DISTRICT** positive and immediate action to ensure the safety of our undocumented students who are currently protected under DACA and those who aren't, through the following measures:
 - a. Make all three SMCCCD colleges sanctuary campuses.
 - i. In doing so, the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) cannot arrest, interview, or search students on the basis of immigration status. Every student has the right to an education free of fear.

 - b. DREAMers centers and free legal clinics (such as Sparkpoint at Cañada and Skyline) at all campuses to provide undocumented students and their families legal advice, counseling, and other services.
- 2. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** to strive for complete transparency and equity across all three campuses.
 - a. Students from all three campuses should have the ability to communicate and be fully knowledgeable of the resources, programs, associated students (AS), academic courses, public safety, and other entities that are on their campus and sister campuses.
 - i. Information must be easily accessible for students and members of the community to understand the function of each campus and their components.
 - ii. Information regarding appropriation of funds and fiscal capacity for on campus resources must be available to the public.
 - b. Student should not have to travel from their home campus to a sister campus in order to receive necessary resources. For the reason that the majority of these resources are intended for marginalized communities, lack of transportation is an issue that may arise. Thus, this problem must be confronted and resolved. These resources must be equitably distributed fiscally throughout the district.
 - i. A DREAMers center or similar legal clinic and resource center should exist on each campus to ensure the protection of our undocumented students. [REFER TO (1.b.)]
 - *ii.* The implementation or expansion of disability resource centers on all three campuses.
 - iii. The implementation or expansion of a Veteran's resource center to support those who worked in the armed forces.

- 1. Extensive counseling and support must be added or enhanced within this program.
- iv. The implementation or expansion of a multicultural center (MCC) on each campus.
 - 1. This includes a director of the MCC in order to assist with events specifically planned by this resource.
- v. The implementation or expansion of psychological support services for LGBTQ+ students and other marginalized students on each campus.

 [REFER TO (7.)]
- vi. Prayer or spiritual rooms must be present on each campus in order to ensure the safety of all students, regardless of religious identity.
- vii. The implementation or expansion of EOPS and/or other similar services across the district to assure the importance of education.
- 3. **WE NEED OUR CAMPUSES** to continue to promote open and safe campuses for all students, regardless of personal identity.
 - a. Each campus must be committed to physically, mentally, emotionally, and spiritually protect their students and members of the community when on campus grounds.
 - b. We need at least one building on each campus to be readily accessible 24/7 for student use.
 - i. This is to assure students they matter on campus and their education and/or their passion is respected.
 - ii. Student ID must be used to enter said building after certain hours.
 - iii. The current issue of housing and gentrification must be interjected within conversation. [REFER TO (6.)]
- 4. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** to expand workshops centered around cultural sensitivity and ally awareness for administration, faculty, staff, public safety, student senate, or people of any student-serving position.
 - a. Professors and people in student-serving positions must go through cultural fluency and microaggression workshops each semester as part of their contract.
 - i. We envision the ability of professors, not only within the ethnic studies department, to hold the capability of creating a broader cultural and ethnic representation within their department curriculum than usual in science, English, psychology and other courses. In this regard, students will learn about the contributions of other groups of people, not only in the context of ethnic/sociological studies.

- ii. We need of our faculty to plan out alternative curriculums with focus on the experiences and contributions of historically marginalized groups and not solely that of the Eurocentric narrative.
 - 1. Whitewashing or failure to acknowledge and understand marginalized communities' oppression is unacceptable. Even if the class is centered around European or Anglo-American history, the implications of European/Anglo-American imperialism and influence throughout the globe should be reiterated as a root cause of instability and oppression throughout many regions and people.
- b. Every student who enrolls at Skyline, CSM, and Canada must go through a cultural sensitivity and ally awareness workshop before registering for any class.
 - i. Any student who is already registered must complete this workshop before fall semester of 2017.
- 5. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** to ensure the protection and expansion of Diversity Studies, including without limitation: LGBTQ+ Studies, Ethnic Studies, and Women and Gender Studies.
 - a. At least 6 credits of Diversity Studies courses must be completed in order to be able to receive a degree/certificate or transfer to a UC/Private College/CSU.
 - b. The implementation of a general committee to advocate for an ethnic studies department which would span across all three sister campuses.
 - i. Although CSM has a larger student body, Skyline and Canada are also in need of capable ethnic studies programs to address social, political, and economical perspectives from different ethnic groups. It is necessary to develop a program which will focus on bringing forth the experiences, negative and positive, as well as the accomplishments and failures of marginalized groups.
 - ii. In order to expand the department, more funding for ethnic studies professors, programs, and curriculum development.
- 6. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** to engage in efforts for housing assistance programs and homeless resources on each campus, especially for high-risk students.
 - a. Due to the current housing crisis in the Bay Area, tools should be provided to students facing rent hikes, displacement, eviction, or homelessness.
 - i. Housing support in the form of legal assistance and exposure to available outside organizations that help families/individuals find or keep sustainable and affordable housing.

- 7. **WE NEED OUR CAMPUSES** to extend and expand cultural community gatherings on our campuses for all races and ethnicities.
 - a. Creating more opportunities where all students can meet, greet, and share individual experiences with their peers across all campuses.
 - b. Have school-sponsored cultural awareness and diversity celebration events for marginalized communities.
 - This should be extended to all people regardless of race or ethnicity.
 These must be places for people to learn and understand others for who they are.
- 8. **WE NEED OUR CAMPUSES** to strive for the expansion of psychological services, specifically pertaining to counseling for hate crimes, LGBTQ+ issues, and other problems our most vulnerable students may encounter.
 - A. We need comprehensive training for mental health services that will be provided for all three colleges. Students of color and other marginalized students face economic and social hardships that contribute to higher rates of depression and other psychological problems. If counseling/psychological services were able to attend to the needs of students, there would be an increase in academic and social achievement. We should focus on training that would incorporate the experiences of historically marginalized groups.
 - B. In response to the increase in hate crimes, we need support and security from all campuses. In order for students to focus on studies, our psychological/physical needs must be obtainable through representation and proper instruction. This includes; ethnicity, religious affiliation, sex, and gender.
 - C. Mental health services for marginalized students should be emphasized through outreach, staff assistance, and effective communication. This could possibly be executed through a committee of faculty and student leaders.
 - D. Sexual assault and other title IX victims must have the necessary tools to receive psychological help in regards to their experience(s).
- 9. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES** to have our Public Safety facilitate themselves in a more community oriented manner than a police oriented one.
 - a. No further arming of public safety.
 - i. This includes restricting the introduction of local police departments on all 3 campuses.
 - 1. The current social and structural interaction between armed officers and marginalized communities includes heightened tension that must be understood. The fears of our most vulnerable students

regarding correctional officers must be respected and wholeheartedly communicated.

- b. Conduct yearly evaluations on the Public Safety staff and trainings.
 - i. Have a public forum about perception of public safety officers each semester. This must be open and inclusive to all students and members of the SMCCCD community.
- c. Have a direct filing system for complaints against public safety that administrators have to evaluate.
 - i. The inclusion of students within this process is recommended in order to ensure proper procedure.
- d. Research must be conducted regarding the predatory ticketing job of public safety on all 3 campuses.
 - i. Giving tickets to students who lack parking passes is not a portion of safety. Thus, consideration of removing role should be an option.
- e. Thorough training on understanding the effects of implicit biases and the concerns of mass incarceration/police brutality in regards to social, political, and historical conditions must be presented on a semester basis to public safety and other similar positions.
- 10. **WE NEED OUR DISTRICT** to comprise a specific board that includes a student senate member, a minimum of one administrator, one diversity faculty member (race and ethnicity studies, gender studies, etc.) and grievance/disciplinary board to hear students who report hate crimes.
 - a. Students of all background must be included in these processes in order to sustain an equitable decision making structure.
- 11. WE NEED OUR DISTRICT AND CAMPUSES to commit to addressing ongoing issues regarding environmental sustainability.
 - a. This includes the funding of educational programs on each campus.
 - i. The expansion of environmental sciences and sustainability efforts on campuses must be included.
 - b. The entire district should consult San Mateo counties' new energy provider, Peninsula Clean Energy, in order to procure more renewable sources.
- 12. WE NEED OUR DISTRICT to strive for free community college.
 - a. That all three colleges be free and accessible with the understanding that education is a right for the residents of San Mateo County.
 - The district should implement and support the proposal and make a tuition free college district.

ii. Implement outreach programs for ex-felons and other similar potential students.
