The meeting was called to order at 2:16 p.m.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF PRIOR MEETING(S)

Motion to approve the minutes of the Monday, October 9, 2017, meeting Senator Wang; seconded by Senator Meneses. Hearing no objections, the motion carried.

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND HEARING OF THE PUBLIC

None.

REPORTS

President Riley stated that he had enjoyed attending the annual California Community College Student Affairs Association Conference in San Jose; he hoped that everyone's week was going well and encouraged everyone to keep studying for their classes. Mr. Riley also indicated that he was happy with the updated college mission statement.

Secretary Chavez announced that Botany Club would be meeting on Friday at 12:10 p.m. in Building 36, Room 200.

Student Life and Leadership Assistant Hamadeh reported that keys to the Senate office would be distributed for a \$20 deposit that would be given back at the end of the semester after returning the keys. He noted that, with the keys, Senate members were only allowed in the office after 10:30 p.m. from Monday to Thursday, and after 7:00 p.m. on Friday. Keys were to be given out on a first come, first served basis.

APPOINTMENTS

President Riley made the following appointments:

Motion to approve the appointment by Senator Langenbacher; seconded by Senator Meneses. Hearing no objections, the motion carried.

LEGISLATIVE BILLS

None.

REVIEW OF STRATEGIC PLANS, METRICS, AND TARGETS

The Senate looked over a set of metrics that measured the San Mateo Community College District's performance in fulfilling three goals: to improve student success, to promote academic excellence, and to increase program delivery options. Results were taken from a cohort of full-time, first-time students each year, as well as non-cohort students; these results accounted for numerous components, including completion of SEP plans, fall-to-spring persistence, enrollment in different mathematics and English levels, degree completion, and transfers to UC or CSU. Data was taken from each college, as well as the entire district; students were presented with a variety of trends and were also shown the goals set by the district for future semesters.

Student Life and Leadership Manager Schaefer noted that, out of the several thousand students attending CSM, only about one and a half thousand transferred to a UC or CSU each year; he conveyed that this was partly because these students were typically involved in some kind of program or organization on campus.

FUNDING FOR PROJECT HAVFUN BY STEM CLUB

Representatives from STEM Club, a new club at CSM, wanted to conduct a research project to investigate the effects of high speed racing on the body; they coined the project "HAVFUN," for High Acceleration and Velocity for Understanding and Knowledge. Research will be hosted at the K1 Speed Go Kart Facility in South San Francisco, sponsored in part by K1's STEAM Education program to help students expand upon their own research. Ten students from the STEM Club will have the opportunity to race in go-karts, data will be collected through several tests involving the car, as well as the drivers. The date for STEM Club's event has yet to be determined.

Costs for the trip include \$750 for admission of ten members, \$150 for travel expenses to the facility, and \$100 for taxes and miscellaneous items; equipment for research from the CSM Physics Department will be utilized at the facility for free, as well. A total budget of \$1,000 was proposed to the Senate for Project HAVFUN.

Motion approve \$1,000 to fund Project HAVFUN by Commissioner of Publicity Gomez Torres; seconded by Senator Meneses.

By a vote of 13 in favor, 0 opposed, and 2 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR THADINGYUT LIGHT FESTIVAL BY SOUTHEAST ASIA CULTURE CLUB

Youn Thu from Southeast Asia Culture Club proposed a funding request for the club's first event that would celebrate Thadingyut, a light festival honored in Myanmar. Ms. Thu conveyed that holding this light festival would immerse the student body in Burmese culture; students would be able to create their own lanterns and float them on the fountain in front of Building 10. They would also get to try different Burmese cuisine, clothes, and other activities. Youn Thu stated that, since many Burmese students could travel back home to celebrate the actual festival, it would help them feel a sense of familiarity here at CSM. The event will be held on Thursday, October 19th, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.; the club is seeking volunteers to cover tabling during the light festival. A total of \$350 was proposed solely for food; Senator Topete Eng Goon and Vice President Relos both recommended raising the initial funds to ensure that food would not run out too quickly. The budget for food at the event was then raised to \$500.

Expenses for the Thadingyut Light Festival include \$500 for food, \$120 for lanterns, and \$80 for other decorations. A total of \$700 was proposed to cover the whole event.

Motion approve \$700 by Senator Topete Eng Goon; seconded by Senator Bathai.

By a vote of 15 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR STUDENT TRANSPORTATION PILOT PROGRAM

Advisor Schaefer apprised the Senate on the district's plans of ameliorating student transportation issues; a pilot program that would provide 1,000 students with \$10 per month bus passes was proposed. About 400 students from CSM, 400 from Skyline, and 200 from Cañada, will be included in the initial effort to gauge interest in the program, as well as quantify how effective and efficient it is. If enough students show that they would take advantage of the discounted bus pass, the SamTrans board will vote on approving the initiative. One task the district must fulfill is to identify specific groups of students who would most likely utilize the bus passes; international students and students from different programs and learning communities would all have a stronger focus.

A total of \$20,000 worth of students interested in partaking in the SMCCD transit pilot program was proposed; this budget would be taken out of the ASCSM Reserve.

Motion to approve \$20,000 to fund the SMCCD transit pilot program by Senator Briones; seconded by Senator Wang.

By a vote of 15 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR ADDITIONAL "UNITE" T-SHIRTS AND DISCUSSION OF "UNITE" EVENTS

Senators Topete Eng Goon and Barajas conveyed that, once Advocacy Board and Cultural Awareness Board met the following day, plans for upcoming "Unite" Day events would be forwarded to the Senate and Executive Cabinet. Additional "Unite" t-shirts will be distributed at future events, and thus, a budget of \$1,800 was proposed to cover the costs of buying more shirts.

Motion to approve \$1,800 to fund a total of about 250 shirts by Senator Topete Eng Goon; seconded by Senator Meneses.

By a vote of 15 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR CALIFORNIA FIRE RELIEF FUNDRAISER

Student Life and Leadership Manager Schaefer told members of the Senate that many California residents were affected by the ongoing wildfires throughout the state; he stated that, although all donations would help, the daily need for different items fluctuated. Because of this, funds would be the most effective in providing support, giving people the opportunity to buy what they actually need. Heading preparation for the fundraiser was a task force comprised of Senators Topete Eng Goon, Bathai, Barajas, and Liu.

A \$2,000 immediate donation, as well as an additional \$2,000 in matching funds was proposed to the Senate to be taken out of the Programming account.

Motion to approve \$4,000 in total for the California fire relief fundraiser by Senator Liu; seconded by Senator Wang.

By a vote of 13 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

CCCSAA CONFERENCE DEBRIEF

Commissioner of Publicity Gomez Torres indicated that she thought more highly of the San Jose CCCSAA Conference than the previous one in Los Angeles; she thought that the workshops were more useful to student leaders, and that the hotel was also amenable.

Senator Wang claimed that some of the workshops during the conference were great, while others were not; she also pointed out that, compared to ASCSM, many student governments had meager numbers of people involved.

Secretary Chavez highlighted Ms. Wang's point, mentioning that the American River College only had seven members in their AS organization; he also recounted a discussion he had with another student government leader, who remarked that not enough attention was being brought to AB 540 students.

Senator Topete Eng Goon stated that she was not fond of the hotel they had stayed at, nor the speakers who conducted keynotes during meals; she also expressed that some of the workshops at the conference were better than the ones of the conference that took place in Los Angeles.

President Riley reiterated Ms. Topete Eng Goon's point, noting that the keynotes from politicians felt like shameless plugs for their own agendas; he also recalled a noteworthy presentation from an advisor at Sierra College on campus climate.

Senator Bathai observed that ASCSM was a very fortunate student government, whereas many other AS organizations were not as privileged.

Finance Director Helsel recounted his attendance of a workshop on parliamentary procedure, describing that it was not useful.

Vice President Relos thought that the speakers during this conference were a bit boring; she also enjoyed the workshops at this conference more than she did at the previous one.

Several members of the Senate commended one of the workshop speakers, Frank Kitchen, for his enthusiasm, charisma, and creativity; many were willing to bring him to the CSM campus in the future.

ASCSM STATEMENT VIDEO

Vice President Relos indicated that she would send out the statement video to the Senate via email once final touches were made; the video was posted on YouTube for viewing.

Commissioner of Publicity Gomez Torres announced that EOPS Club was selling chocolates for a price of \$2.50.

Student Life and Leadership Assistant Hamadeh told the Senate that, this Thursday, the campus would be holding California ShakeOut procedures for earthquake preparedness.

This bill amends the Immigration and Nationality Act to provide an individual in any removal, exclusion, or deportation proceeding or inspection (excluding primary inspections as defined by Department of Homeland Security policies) with a right to representation (at no expense to the government) by counsel of such individual's choosing, including remote counseling if counsel cannot personally meet with the individual.

Bill Description

The holding or detention of individuals at a port of entry or at any holding or detention facility overseen by U.S. Customs and Border Protection or U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement shall: (1) be limited to the briefest term and the least restrictive conditions practicable, (2) be consistent with the rationale for such holding or detention; and (3) shall include access to food, water, and rest room facilities.
