ANNOUNCEMENTS AND HEARING OF THE PUBLIC

Senator Bathai reminded members to RSVP for the ASCSM Board Mixer at Gyu Kaku in downtown San Mateo during next week's flex day, March 8th.

Student Life and Leadership Assistant Hamadeh told the Senate that the next meeting for both the Senate and Programming Board will be held in Building 10, Room 195, rather than the usual conference room.

Vice Chair Paing announced that the International Education Office would be hosting a film event on March 6th; the film is a Filipino comedy with subtitles, and a Q&A/discussion will take place following the film. Mr. Paing also indicated that a silent disco to conclude Umoja's Black History Month event will be held from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. on Wednesday, February 28th in the Bayview Dining Room.

Student Life and Leadership Manager Schaefer insisted that if members were sick, they stay home, so as not to spread their illness with others.

Vice President Relos and Senator Barajas declared that Senators would cover various topics on sex and sexuality, transgender awareness, and feminism for the upcoming ASCSM Feminist Week. They reminded members that the would take place from March 13th through March 15th; Tuesday would cover sex and sexuality, Wednesday would have a keynote speaker, and Thursday would cover transgender awareness.

FUNDING FOR SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA UNIVERSITY TOUR BY TRANSFER CLUB

Each year, the CSM Transfer Club tours several university campuses throughout California; this year, the club will tour UCLA, UCSB, USC, and CSU Long Beach. During these tours, students will have the opportunity to learn more about different schools they might transfer to through campus walks and talking to admissions representatives, current students, and other members of the universities' communities. Five chaperones will accompany the trip (on March 26th and 27th), which will accommodate about 40 students.

A total of \$3,000.00 from the 5031 Club Assistance/ICC Account was proposed to fund Transfer Club's Southern California University Tour; however, ICC rules dictate that the largest expenditure a club can request is \$2,500.00. The current request was changed to \$2,500.00; a source for the remaining \$500.00 will be found soon. This money will cover the hotel expenses for 40 students and several chaperones.

Motion to approve \$2,500.00 to fund Transfer Club's Southern California University Tour by Vice Chair Paing; seconded by Senator Thu. By a vote of 10 in favor, 0 opposed, and 1 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR STANFORD UNIVERSITY CLINICAL ANATOMY LAB TOUR

The CSM Medical Scholars Club will be touring Stanford University's clinical anatomy lab in their R&D area; students will have the chance to see one of the most innovative research/technological centers in the country, examine human cadavers, and learn more about the human body. This trip will not only benefit students who are planning on going into the medical field, but also those who simply have an interest in science or human anatomy/physiology. A total of 28 students may have the opportunity to attend this eye-opening experience.

A total of \$1,000.00 from the Club Assistance/ICC Account was proposed to fund the Medical Scholars Club's trip to Stanford's clinical anatomy lab; fees will be \$35.00 per attendee.

Motion to approve \$1,000.00 to fund Medical Scholars Club's tour of Stanford University's clinical anatomy lab by Senator Bathai; seconded by Senator Qobti. By a vote of 11 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR ROBOTICS CLUB SUPPLIES

Due to the absence of a representative from Robotics Club, this item was tabled for a future ASCSM Senate meeting.

FUNDING FOR LABYRINTH RECEPTION

In celebration of the Writers' Project's most recent issue of the *Labyrinth*, the club will be putting on a small launch party. The *Labyrinth* is a student-published literary magazine that includes creative pieces by students throughout the SMCCD, put out every semester. Funding for the reception will cover the costs of printing large posters of the magazine's cover, catering, and copies of old and new editions of the *Labyrinth*. This event will be held on March 22nd.

A total of \$1,500.00 from the 5031 Club Assistance/ICC Account was proposed to fund the Writers' Project's reception for the *Labyrinth*.

Motion to approve \$1,500.00 to cover the launch party of the *Labyrinth* by Senator Thu; seconded by Senator Briones. By a vote of 11 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR ASCSM POWER OF WORDS EVENT

This semester, ASCSM will be hosting a Unity event to educate the campus community on the impact of language. This event is inspired by the recent winter leadership retreat at the Museum of Tolerance in Los Angeles. The Power of Words event will be put on by the three ASCSM Boards, with each board covering a different aspect of the power that language has on our daily lives, on legislation, and in our history. Costs for the event will cover food, supplies, t-shirt making, and potentially a speaker. The dates for this event have yet to be determined.

A total of \$2,000.00 from the 5150 Programs account was proposed to fund the Power of Words event.

Motion to approve \$2,000.00 to fund ASCSM's Power of Words event by Senator Thu; seconded by Senator Wang. By a vote of 11 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

REPORT ON CAMPUS SAFETY

Due to the absence of a representative from the Campus Safety Department, this item was tabled for a future ASCSM Senate meeting.

STUDY OF CSM EDUCATIONAL MASTER PLAN

The Senate reviewed a variety of data covering information on student success, retention, basic skills, and satisfaction, among other things; this data will serve as the guidelines for goals the campus may have to improve in different areas. The Senate discussed and listed strengths that they observed in CSM, as well as weakness, opportunities for growth, and threats the campus might have in the next couple of years. 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"College for All" California ballot initiative begins signature gathering to qualify for November election

One December 22, 2017, signature gathering began to qualify an initiative for the November ballot to make California Colleges free again. Early supporters of the initiative include the California Federation of Teachers (including your local, AFT 1493), the UC Student Workers Union, and a wide variety of community organizing groups. CFT has pledged \$50,000 to help get the measure on the ballot.

Earlier vision in California Master Plan

This is not the first time we have fought for free college education. 50 years ago, in the midst of national struggles for civil rights, social reformers in California sought to ensure access to higher education for all. In 1960, the

California Master Plan for Higher Education put forward a vision and a process to ensure that California postsecondary education would be available to all students who were "capable of benefiting from instruction". Along with ensuring that students would be able to attend either the UC system, the California State system or the California community college system, the plan also banned tuition in an attempt to prevent cost from being a barrier to post-secondary education for California residents.

Huge increases in college fees have led to massive student debt

Fifty years later, cost has become one of the major reasons students cannot attend college. If they choose to go, they are saddled with debt that is difficult to repay for the large majority of students. While the schools still cannot collect tuition, they are allowed to collect fees for other costs, and over time, as public post-secondary institutions have faced decreasing funding from state and federal governments, those fees have increased exponentially.

College costs increase income inequality

The prohibitive cost of college, which has been a problem for many years, has finally been pushed to the forefront in college reform struggles over the last several years thanks to a larger general discussion about the increasing income gap. In fact, it shouldn't be that surprising that two of the places first to implement some form of "free college" were New York state and San Francisco, places in which the disparity between those who have and those who have-not is most stark. New York's measure promises

free tuition for families earning \$110,000 or less per year (and will increase to \$125,000 per year in 2019). San Francisco's measure, while serving a smaller number of students since it is a city-wide measure and not a state one, offers free tuition to



ALL students.

College grants to be funded by an estate tax

The "College for All" Initiative will create a grant that will cover the undergraduate tuition for all Californians who attend a UC, CSU or California community college. In addition, it will also increase the maximum Cal-grant aid that provides support for living expenses while attending college. The initiative is based on the implementation of an estate tax. Currently, there is no estate tax in California. In fact, according to the bill, high-wealth estates have paid no estate tax since 2005. The estate tax proposed for funding the "College for All" initiative is a "high-value estate tax" on amounts over \$7 million (\$3.5 million for individuals). This is only the top 0.2% of Californians.

The "College for All" initiative, while in its initial stages, is an important first step toward making college affordable again for many Californians. Whatever happens in November, we can be sure that ensuring access to quality postsecondary education is a fight that we should be invested in. □
