REPORTS

Vice President Giari told the Senate that President Bathai was currently attending District Participatory Governance Committee meeting. She encouraged members to like ASCSM's social media pages and to volunteer for Reboot Week.

Vice Chair Paing reminded Senators to make sure that clubs submitted their information packets to become active this semester; he also reported that Club Fair would be held on February 19th and 20th in the Bayview Dining Room.

Senators Nava and Perrilliat announced that the Programming Board's Reboot Week event would took place from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday, and also from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Wednesday evening. Jamba Juice and sandwiches from Mendocino Farms would be served on Tuesday, and on Wednesday, pizza and boba drinks would be handed out; for the night event, muffins, hot cocoa, tea, and coffee would be distributed. Ms. Nava also reported that the Board was planning an event for Valentine's Day; students would be given succulents and bags with chocolates.

Senator Young reported that the CSM Jazz Ensemble would be hosting a benefit concert on Sunday, February 10th, for victims of the recent Camp Fire.

Student Life and Leadership Assistant Hamadeh introduced the Senate to Mary, the Student Life Center's newest student assistant.

LEGISLATIVE BILLS

H.R. 136 Federal Intern Protection Act of 2019

The purpose of this bill is to require that the protections applicable to federal employees also be made to shield federal interns from acts of discrimination and sexual harassment; this bill also protects applicants for federal internships. Interns are signified as volunteers who conduct voluntary, uncompensated service to learn a trade or occupation.

Recommendation from the Advocacy Board: Support

Motion to support H.R. 136 Federal Intern Protection Act of 2019 by Senator Martin; seconded by Vice Chair Paing. By a vote of 15 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

S. 127 SAFE Act

The purpose of this bill is to extend DACA, Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, from executive order, to written law. SAFE Act will grant employee authorization a three-year provisional protection to those under DACA from removal by the Department of Homeland Security. Due to the recent opposition to DACA under the current administration, this bill was forwarded to the United States Senate.

Recommendation from the Advocacy Board: Support

Motion to support S. 127 SAFE Act by Senator Langi; seconded by Vice Chair Paing. By a vote of 15 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

H.R. 1510 States' Education Reclamation Act of 2017

The purpose of this bill is to abolish the United States' Department of Education and repeal any program for which it is has had administrative responsibility. As a result of this bill, federal funding for education would then be under the jurisdiction of individual states. Responsibility for financial aid would also be placed under the Department of the Treasury. The Department of Education's job training programs would be transferred to the Department of Labor.

Recommendation from the Advocacy Board: Oppose

Motion to oppose H.R. 1510 States' Education Reclamation Act of 2017 by Senator Gaines; seconded by Senator Nava. By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 1 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR ART & SCIENCE LECTURE RECEPTION

On behalf of Professor Mohsen Janatpour, Senator Ryng presented the funding request for the reception of CSM's 32nd Annual Art & Science Lecture. This event is hosted by Professor Mohsen Janatpour, a physics and mathematics professor at the College. The presentation includes a lecture, art exhibition, and observation of the night sky through telescopes. Senator Ryng mentioned that the theme for this year's art, all of which would be created by Professor Janatpour himself, would be the portrayal of objects from different perspectives, utilizing a variety of shapes and colors. Funding was

requested for the presentation's reception to cover food and drink. Members of the campus community will be invited to this event.

Motion to approve \$700.00 from the 5032 College Program Assistance Account to fund the 32nd Annual Art & Science Lecture Reception by Senator Young; seconded by Senator Gaines.

Concerns were raised when it was noted that the event would showcase art created by Mr. Janatpour; several Senators exhibited slight apprehension towards this part of the presentation, questioning how this would directly benefit students. Others remarked that, in the past, the event was an enriching experience that combined art with science in a unique way. In order to gain more information on what the event would entail, it was suggested that the item be tabled for the following Senate meeting.

Motion to table Item A, "Funding for Art & Science Lecture Reception," by Senator Martin; seconded by Senator Viana. Hearing one objection by Senator Ryng, the motion was brought to a vote. By a vote of 7 in favor, 6 opposed, and 3 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR TRANSFER TRIBUTE CEREMONY

Advisor Hamadeh presented the funding request for this year's Transfer Tribute Ceremony. Each year, this ceremony is put on to honor CSM students who will be transferring, though not necessarily graduating from the College with an AA or AS degree. The ceremony typically includes short speeches, an open mic, giveaways, and free food. The event will be held on Thursday, May 23rd, in the Building 10, Bayview Dining Room. RSVPs will be required to attend this event. Funding will be allocated towards covering refreshments, decorations, and giveaway items.

Motion to approve \$5,000.00 from the 5032 College Program Assistance Account to fund the Transfer Tribute Ceremony by Senator Martin; seconded by Senator Nava. By a vote of 15 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

FUNDING FOR ALLAN R. BROWN OUTSTANDING SERVICE & LEADERSHIP AWARD

Advisor Hamadeh presented the funding request for the honorariums under the Allan R. Brown Scholarship Award, which is given to six students who have displayed exceptional leadership, remarkable accomplishment, outstanding personal character, and inspiration to fellow students. This award was named after a past Dean of Students and Vice President of Student Services, Allan R. Brown. Each honorarium will be \$500.00 for a total of \$3,000.00 requested. Nominations for this scholarship may be put forward by any member of the campus community.

Motion to approve \$3,000.00 from the 5050 Awards & Scholarships Account to fund the Allan R. Brown Award by Senator Martin; seconded by Senator Nava. By a vote of 15 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

Purpose of Bill

To regulate semiautomatic/automatic firearms, including those that utilize a portion of the energy of a firing cartridge to extract the fired cartridge case and chamber the next round + requires a pull of the trigger to fire each cartridge; has a pistol and forward grip (the quintessential double grip look of an assault rifle/shotgun); has a telescoping or folding stock (an extension on a rifle that holds additional cartridges, magazines, or even grenades, barrel shrouds (used to cool down a firearm after several quick rounds), and/or threaded barrels (used as an attachment to the silencer to reduce sound intensity [already considered a characteristic of an assault rifle in several states]); has a stabilizing brace or similar component; weighs 50 oz or more when unloaded, etc. Includes pretty much all AK's,

machine guns, and many more as listed in the bill. It prevents semi/automatic firearms from being imported, sold, transferred, manufactured, processed, or possessed in interstate commerce (no out-of-state gun show loopholes anymore). This does not apply to lawfully possessed firearms. This bill does not apply to manually operated firearms, inoperable firearms (duh), or antique firearms. It's a generally well-researched, fair, and comprehensive approach at what the public wants out of a potential gun control law.

Bill Description

As stated above, it restricts the buying and selling of semiautomatic or automatic firearms based on a criteria of what constitutes a firearm (mainly constituted of other states' definitions). Background checks will be mandatory. It also prevents grandfathered weapons to be transferred, gifted, or sold to another unlicensed, unchecked party. Semiautomatic firearms will also be issued identification as semiautomatic legibly or conspicuously engraved. Secure storage and a safety device will both be requirements. Large ammunition will also be identified with an engraving.

Recommended Stance and Justification

Support, oppose, watch? Why?

Support, by all means! As students, coming forth with a bill like this has greater impact given the recent urgency and severity pertaining to the issue of school safety.

Allows for the importation of prescription drugs that are less expensive, from certified foreign sellers/pharmacies, and from certified foreign wholesale distributors or 'importers' (refers to type of dispensation specifically). Amend the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act to allow for the importation of affordable and safe drugs by wholesale distributors, pharmacies, and individuals.

To significantly lower prescription drug prices for patients in the United States by ending government-granted monopolies for manufacturers who charge drug prices that are higher than the median prices at which the drugs are available in other countries.

Bill Description

The secretary will be in charge of dentifying drug that are remarkably overpriced in this country through comparison of drug prices in other industrialized/wealthy nations. Once identified, the prices will be adjusted adequately to the median cost, rather than the excessive overpricing as set by the manufacturer. The countries that will be referenced when considering which drugs are overpriced are Japan, Canada, France, the UK, and Germany. Prices will also be affected based on the percentage of the population affected by a condition for which the drugs are prescribed, the value of the drug (including impact of price on access), costs associated with development of the drug, whether the drug provided significant improvements in patients' health, global revenues generated by the drug, and "whatever factors the secretary deems appropriate." A huge part of why this bill is critical is the call to break up monopolies of big pharma, aka the conglomerates that commodify sickness to the point where treatment is made inaccessible. This bill also promises a public database of drug prices that gives a rundown on companies and pricing.
