COURSE DESCRIPTION

Theory and techniques of public speaking in a democratic society. Discovery, development, and criticism of ideas in public discourse through research, reasoning, organization, extemporaneous delivery, and evaluation of various types of speaking including informative and persuasive speeches. Transfer credits to UC and CSU

2. Written assignments

a. Speech outlines: Due the class before speeches begin. Late outlines receive no credit. The outline should clearly identify the goal of your speech and it should contain your purpose statement. All relevant bibliographic information must be included as part of the outline.

3. Critiques/Lab modules: TBD Hours

COMM 110 has a TBA (To Be Arranged Hours) requirement that you must fulfill as part of your enrollment in this course. These TBA hours are not homework but are instructional activities designed to augment the lecture portion of the course. You are required to complete the activities shown below in Communication Studies Resource Center in 10-220, and you must document that you have attended 10-220 for **at least 50 minutes prior to census.** Be sure to log in and out of the Accudemia system every time you work on one of the activities in 10-220. The TBA requirement must be completed for the number of hours indicated in the schedule of Classes. The lab activities include videotaped rehearsals of speeches and presentations, self and peer critiques, job interview role-play, group meetings, research, and consultation with an instructor on lab modules.

- 2. Final Exam: Test questions are from the textbook and lectures. The exam will be multiple choice and t/f.

5. Class Participation

Students are expected to participate in all class activities such as group discussions and peer evaluations. You will be required to provide written feedback to your peers. Students will be randomly assigned to evaluate speeches during class.

<u>Late Speech</u>: Students are allowed to make up one late speech each semester in the Lab in 10-220 at 65% of the credit. There is a "Late Speech" folder with instructions under my name Sarah Howard in the Lab.

Introduction Speech: a 5-minute maximum speech on an interesting fact about yourself;

outline is not needed.

Informative Speech: a 5-6-minute research based educational speech with a minimum of 4 sources and a formal outline.

Impromptu Speech: 3 minutes to prep, 5 minute speech.

Disrupted Persuasive Speech: a 7-8 minute speech on a controversy that divides society, with a minimum of 6 sources and a formal outline.

Rebuttal: a 4-5 minute speech showing your disagreement to one of your classmate's arguments in his/her persuasive speech, with a minimum of 2 sources. Formal outline is not needed.
