Despite these challenges I would agree with my colleague: communication is the single biggest ongoing challenge that a college president faces.

I believe that the difficult times are behind us. The future certainly looks better than it did a few years ago. However, communication can be difficult even when things are going well.

I recognize that there have been times when I could have done a better job in communicating with all of you. It is a difficult task. All of us are all flooded with information and I have been sensitive about "information overload". Furthermore, the

often irrelevant to another.

I have decided to try something new. I would like to provide a brief weekly update every Monday morning during the academic year. This is a work in progress and I want the update to be useful. Get to Know: Gary Dilley, Interim VPI


Gary is a true CSM Bulldog.
