We look forward to seeing you at the forum and having campus-wide involvement!

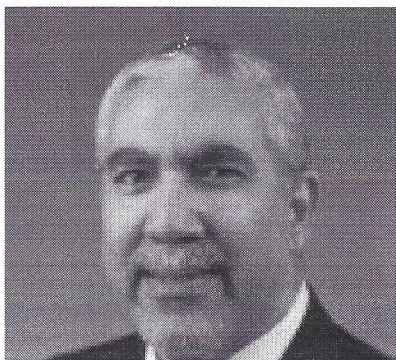

Finalist Biographies:

Moaty Fayek, Ed.D.



As Dean of the Business, Computer Science, and Applied Technologies Division at De Anza College, Dr. Fayek supervises six academic departments including two of De Anza College's most recognized and

successful CTE programs, Automotive Technology and Design and Manufacturing Technologies. His duties also include managing the College's federally and state-funded workforce education activities including the Perkins IC, CTE Enhancement, and CTE Transitions. The division successfully secured several grants including a \$1 million grant to renovate the manufacturing facility. His division services more than 5,500 students per quarter and has more than 100 faculty and 12 staff.

In his role as the Interim Vice President of Workforce Development and Institutional Advancement at Foothill College, Dr. Fayek worked with the faculty and staff to increase CTE dual credit enrollment. He was instrumental in restructuring the apprenticeship programs and engaging the apprenticeship faculty into college participatory governance for the first time.

While chair of the Department of Computer Science at CSU Chico, he led the department through the most extensive curriculum overhaul for the first-time in its 40-year history and successfully led two programs through a rigorous accreditation process. He worked with the regional community colleges to align their programs with the department's curriculum, developed community outreach programs, and hosted monthly events to reach out to local and regional industries and businesses, earning an Educator Commitment to the Business Community Excellence Award. Under his leadership, enrollment increased by approximately 50%.

Dr. Fayek was born in Tanta, Egypt where he graduated with a BS in electrical engineering from Cairo University. He studied in Germany, Belgium, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom. He also received a MS in computer science from California State University, Chico and a doctorate in community college leadership at Ferris State University.

Michael Holtzclaw, Ph.D.



Dr. Mike Holtzclaw has been working in higher education for 25 years. He is the Senior Dean at the San Ramon Campus of Diablo Valley College, serving as the chief administrator for the campus. The San Ramon Campus serves more than 3,000 students and offers a wide range of academic programs and student

services. Prior to this role, he was the Dean of Science, Engineering and Mathematics at Ohlone College. He has also served as an Instructional Dean overseeing a variety of transfer and career education programs at Central Oregon Community College in Bend, Oregon and as an Assistant Dean of Admissions at Lewis & Clark College in Portland, Oregon.

Prior to moving into administration, Dr. Holtzclaw was a geography professor at Central Oregon Community College for 13 years. He held many leadership roles while in the faculty, including serving as the chief negotiator for the faculty union, as department chair and in leadership roles on numerous governance committees. He created and led an interdisciplinary study abroad program to Nepal and also led a study abroad program to Florence, Italy.

Dr. Holtzclaw is a first-generation college student who has a passion for creating opportunities for underserved and underrepresented students. He is particularly fascinated with learning about other cultures and studying foreign languages. He has lived in seven countries, studied six languages, visited over 55 countries and is a strong supporter of having community college students study abroad.

Dr. Holtzclaw has a Ph.D. and master's degree in geography from the Ohio State University. He earned a BA degree in international relations, with a minor in Soviet and East European Studies, from Lewis & Clark College.
