At College of San Mateo, education is liberatory. It is part of our vision as a College. We support students to strengthen their voice and build power within their communities in order to shape their future. Our federal designations as a Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) and an Asian American, Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution (AANAPISI) are not just titles. They are commitments to serve our communities. They challenge us to design courses, services, and spaces where culture is an asset, belonging is fundamental, and success is shared.

I would like to highlight two new additions to the College that really brought these commitments to life. This year, CSM launched its Pride Center, the first in our District. The Pride Center provides a daily, visible home for our 2SLGBTQIA+ community (Two-Spirit, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersex, and Asexual). Its programming, peer leadership, and on-site counseling reflect the lived experiences of our students, especially our 2SLGBTQIA+ community.

We also brought CSM closer to where people live and work. With the opening of College of San Mateo Coastside, families can enroll, meet with a counselor, and take a class right in Half Moon Bay. Bilingual town halls, family nights, and partnerships with local organizations continue to shape the site. College of San Mateo Coastside shows what it means to build community with community.

To us, liberatory education means removing barriers and opening doors: through research and internships, industry visits, and civic engagement, to opportunities that change lives close to home. 

Free College at CSM. Our Investment is You!

Having completed its third year of a five-year pilot, Free College (Senate Bill 893) keeps the promise simple: reduce the cost so San Mateo County residents can focus on progress. Since Fall 2022, total enrollment has increased by 24%, and 26,656 students in San Mateo County have directly benefited from zero-tuition access, a real opportunity for many first-generation and historically underserved learners. By March 1, 2026, the San Mateo Community College District will submit a state report on access, outcomes, and fiscal impact, while our Trustees and the Chancellor continue to prioritize program sustainability.

CSM student Maryanna Oliveira shows what this looks like. She arrived unsure if college was financially possible, and then Free College cleared the path. With fees waived, she built a full schedule that fed both her transfer goals and her curiosity (yes, even a favorite songwriting class).

"CSM gave me the opportunity I needed to turn that around," she says, on track and thriving.

What Free College Covers (SB 893)

Teaching for Tomorrow

Teaching and learning at CSM is a continuous journey of equity and innovation, where faculty pursue professional development and tenure milestones while engaging with leading voices. Our Spring 2025 Flex Day programs, or professional development days, included Dr. Gina Ann Garcia who spoke with the College about our HSI (Hispanic-Serving Institution) identity, and Dr. Keali'i Kukahiko who shared thoughts on the imperatives of AANAPISI (Asian Amer-

ican, Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution) designation. These reflections on our federal designations strengthened our mission and educational planning, ensuring alignment with the needs of our diverse students. Meanwhile, students carry this excellence forward, from groundbreaking STEM internships to hands-on industry tours, showcasing how CSM prepares learners for transfer, careers, and leadership in their communities.

Enseñanza Para el Mañana

La enseñanza y el aprendizaje en CSM constituyen un camino continuo de equidad e innovación, donde el profesorado avanzó en su desarrollo profesional y en los distintos logros de título mientras conectaban con voces líderes. Nuestros programas de Flex Day de la primavera de 2025 – jornadas de desarrollo profesional – incluyeron a la Dra. Gina Ann Garcia, quien conversó con el Colegio sobre nuestra identidad como HSI (Institución al Servicio de los Hispanos), y al Dr. Keali'i Kukahiko, quien compartió reflexiones sobre los imperativos de la designación AANAPISI (Institución al Servicio de los Asiático-Amer-

icanos y Nativos de las Islas del Pacífico). Estas reflexiones sobre nuestras designaciones federales fortalecieron nuestra misión y la planificación educativa, garantizando la alineación con las necesidades de nuestros estudiantades de diversas comunidades. Mientras tanto, nuestros estudiantes proyectan esta excelencia hacia el futuro, desde prácticas profesionales innovadoras en STEM hasta visitas técnicas a la industria, que muestran cómo CSM prepara nuestros estudiantes para la transferencia, las carreras profesionales y el liderazgo en sus comunidades.

Faculty Who Never Stop Learning

CSM faculty translated research into practice through transparent grading, accessible course design, and belonging-first pedagogy refined in the

Equitable Grading Labs. The work aligns with our HSI & AANAPISI servingness and scales through peer-led Redesign for Equity & Accessibility Lab (REAL) cohorts and a growing repository of templates, fostering better teaching, stronger outcomes, and lasting change.

Research Starts Here


CSM's MESA (Mathematics, Engineering, Science Achievement) program supports first-generation, low-income, and historically underrepresented students in STEM on the path to transfer and bachelor's degrees. MESA students returned from summer internships at top Bay Area labs and shared projects in artificial intelligence, biology, and engineering. They presented the tools they used, ranging from data pipelines and wet-lab protocols to rapid prototyping, as well as what they learned about research culture. Each came back with mentors, results, and a clear plan for the next step.

Where Coursework Meets Careers

Guided by faculty, business students toured Adobe's San Jose HQ to see how product, finance, and marketing teams operate day-to-day. Adobe professionals guided students through a real-world corporate work environment, observed high-level collaboration across multiple functional teams, and addressed career-related questions. Students left the site visit with a clear understanding of how the coursework and group assignments in their classroom relate to what they observed at Adobe. Industry touchpoints like this open doors to possibilities for our students.

Mapping a Future in Computational Biology

Honors Project learning community scholar KyiLei Aye earned a Stanford Winetraub Lab internship through Stanford's CCOP-CORE (Community College Outreach Program – Opportunities in Research Engagement), a paid 10-week research internship for community college students. She contributed to computational biology research, analyzing skin images with machine-learning models to support non-invasive cancer detection, earning third prize at the Stanford Undergraduate Research Conference and co-author credit on a scholarly paper. Building Belonging, Advancing Equity

Equity at CSM is not just a value; it is a practice embedded across our campus that we strive to make stronger every semester. This year, we celebrated our federal designations as a Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) and Asian American, Native American Pacific Islander-Serving Institution (AANAPISI), which affirm our responsibility to create inclusive pathways to completion and beyond. Our community gathered for cultural celebrations, including Día de Los Muertos, Lunar New Year, Kamayan Night, and Black History Month. We opened our

College of San Mateo Coastside educational site at Half Moon Bay, bringing opportunity and educational resources closer to the community. New spaces like the Pride Center gave students space to build community. Nationally, leaders like Dr. Finausina Tovo, who at the time was the Program Services Coordinator for CSM's MANA learning community, carried our message of equity to the White House, showing how CSM's commitment extends beyond San Mateo County.

A nivel nacional, líderes como la Dra. Policy Meets Practice: CSM in Washington

This year, CSM's Dr. Finausina Tovo joined Native Hawaiian Pacific Islander (NHPI) leaders at the Inaugural White House NHPI Convening.



On an education panel spanning pre-K through higher education, she brought CSM's community-informed strategies into a federal conversation representing 1.6 million NHPI people. Her leadership connected policy dialogue to local practice at CSM, where the MANA learning community, which serves CSM's Oceania student population, marks its tenth year as a model for culturally sustaining support. We're proud to see CSM perspectives helping set the agenda for student-centered policy.

Students Leading the Way in Antiracism Work

When students lead antiracism work, solutions meet the moment. CSM's Title V HSI grant provided micro-grants that funded projects, such as a Literacy Circle centered on authors of color and peer programming to identify and address microaggressions. Along the way, students developed career-ready skills in project management, facilitation, and evaluation, while strengthening a sense of belonging and accountability across campus.

Celebrating Who We Are

From community traditional Kamayan feasts to student-led cultural celebrations like *Día de los Muertos*, CSM showcased the stories and traditions that define us. The result: stronger ties, deeper learning, and a campus that feels like a truly connected community. We will continue to make space for everyone to see their fullest selves reflected on campus.



Leaders, Scholars & Champions

In 2024-2025, student success at CSM was evident everywhere: on championship fields, in research posters, during startup pitches, and at community forums. A common thread runs through it all – equitable teaching, hands-on

practice, and strong support systems that turn opportunity into outcomes. These snapshots celebrate students who led, competed, researched, created, and brought our campus together.

Líderes, Académicos y Campeones

Champions Across Seasons

Across football, softball, and track & field, the Bulldogs set the standard. CSM Football captured our second state championship in three years and earned civic recognition for excellence on the field and in the classroom from state-elected officials. Softball swept the playoffs to reclaim the state title and was also honored by elected officials. Track & Field added two individual state championships and nine Coast Conference gold medals.







Scholarship That Starts with Community

CSM's first-year experience seminar (College 1) supports students as they transition to college and introduces them to undergraduate-level research. The program hosted a symposium where students transformed their lived experiences into scholarship using author Tara Yosso's Community Cultural Wealth framework. Through posters, performances, and dialogue, they mapped six forms of cultural capital (aspirational, linguistic, familial, social, navigational, and resistant) and named the assets their families and neighborhoods bring to higher education.

Innovation for Community Good

Auner Barrios Vasquez

When STEM meets entrepreneurship, our students build solutions that matter. A cross-college team of students, including Auner Barrios Vasquez, won the statewide business pitch competition with Urban Canopy, a retractable, solar-responsive awning designed to reduce urban heat where trees can't be planted. Along the way, they participated in a boot camp at Uber, ongoing coaching, and a final pitch before industry judges at PG&E. This opportunity sharpened their skills in human-centered design, rapid prototyping, and storytelling.

Leaders Who Lift Others

From club officers to peer mentors, student leaders made the campus a welcoming and vibrant place. Our end-of-year Student Life & Leadership awards celebrate service, inclusion, and the courage to lead; skills that communities need. Congratulations to this year's honorees:

Holistic Support for Every Student

We believe every student deserves the tools to succeed. This year, CSM celebrated the 1,000th graduate of the Promise Scholars Program, a model of comprehensive support that includes tuition, textbooks, transportation, and counseling. Through SparkPoint, CalFresh outreach, and new transportation

options like SamTrans Route CSM and Way2Go passes, we continue to break down financial and logistical barriers to education. Our Wellness Center and peer-led programs expanded mental health resources, ensuring students find care, connection, and community when they need it most.

Apoyo Integral para Cada Estudiante

Transit That Works for Students

Transportation should not be a barrier to a degree. This year, we expanded a full suite of access programs: 5,000 free Way2Go passes districtwide through our partnership with SamTrans and county partners; unlimited rides on all SamTrans routes for eligible students; a new SamTrans Route CSM linking San Mateo Caltrain to the campus; and the free CSM Shuttle with direct connections to Millbrae BART, Hillsdale Caltrain, Hayward, and Half Moon Bay. Mobility is equity, and it is one way we serve our community.







Chapter of the Year, Culture of Care

CSM's Active Minds, the student-led chapter of a national mental-health education nonprofit, earned National Chapter and Student Leader of the Year, proof that advocacy works when services are strong. The Wellness Center turned momentum into access by hosting health fairs each semester serving hundreds of students, expanding peer education, and keeping personal counseling services accessible when students needed it.

Global Perspectives, Local Belonging

CSM's International Education Program welcomes students from around the world and equips them to thrive. Year-round programming brings global perspectives to campus through International Education Week, language and culture exchanges, career pathway panels, and community events. The annual World Gala celebrates culture and connection with students, families, and community partners. International students enrich every classroom, and

we meet their contributions with an inclusive community and clear pathways to transfer and careers.



Expanding Access Through Community Partnerships


CSM's impact extends beyond the main campus and is grounded in strong and evolving partnerships. The grand opening of CSM Coastside in Half Moon Bay brought new educational opportunities to local residents, celebrated with town halls, family nights, and participation in the Great Pumpkin Parade. Partnerships

flourished through the Black Business Summit, the Bay Area Science Olympiad, and community health outreach events led by CSM nursing students. From community jazz festivals to providing local residents with additional ballot box access, we deepened our role as a vital hub for education, culture, and civic life in San Mateo County.

Ampliando el Acceso a Través de Conexiones Comunitarias

El impacto de CSM se extiende más allá del campus principal y fundado en alianzas sólidas y que siguen evolucionando. La gran inauguración de CSM Coastside en Half Moon Bay llevó nuevas oportunidades educativas a los residentes locales, celebrada con foros comunitarios, noches de familia y la participación en el Great Pumpkin Parade. Las alianzas florecieron a través del Black

Business Summit, el Bay Area Science Olympiad y eventos del bienestar comunitario liderados por estudiantes de Enfermería de CSM. Desde festivales comunitarios de jazz hasta brindar acceso a buzones oficiales de elecciones a los residentes locales, profundizamos nuestro papel como centro vital de educación, cultura y vida cívica en el condado de San Mateo.



Dual Enrollment: College Courses in High School

CSM deepened student-centered partnerships with San Mateo Union and Cabrillo Unified school districts to bring college directly into high school classrooms. Faculty delivered equity-minded, hands-on courses that built belonging and connected learning to careers through field trips, guest speakers, and real-world simulations. Together with our partnering high school districts, we expanded access for historically underserved students and strengthened the pathway to CSM and beyond.



Industry engagement at CSM is handson, local, and built with partners. The Black Business Summit paired entrepreneurs and students for practical advice and access to small-business resources. Career Education Month featured site visits to local tech companies like Oracle, a career panel, and a networking night that paired students with mentors. Together, these partnerships create clear pathways to internships, jobs, and long-term growth.



College of San Mateo Coastside — Education Within Reach, in Downtown Half Moon Bay

As the community's college, we opened College of San Mateo Coastside in October 2024 to bring college closer to where Coastside families live and work. The site at 650 Mill Street in downtown Half Moon Bay is open five days a week, making it easy to get answers, enroll, meet with a counselor, or take a class close to home. In its first year, we held a public ribbon-cutting ceremony, participated in the Great Pumpkin Festival, and maintained a steady rhythm of engagement through open houses and family nights, a multilingual town hall, one-stop registration days, farmers' market tabling, and drop-in academic counseling.

Grounded in partnership, College of San Mateo Coastside is integrated into community life. We convened farmworker-focused programming and a week of events honoring farmworker contributions, and we strengthened ties with Ayudando Latinos A Soñar (ALAS), the Boys & Girls Club, and the Half Moon Bay Library to co-host bilingual workshops and outreach. For neighbors, local leaders, and employers, we are committed to partnering with our Coastside community to co-locate services, host workforce and college-going events, and build pathways that keep education and opportunity close to home.
