Priorities for discussion in the coming year—some general suggestions:

- Compressed calendar (timeline, ensure demo discussion, effect on short classes)
- Effect of executive orders, changing political climate on academic freedom, hiring
- **Budget:** Enhancing revenues vs cutting expenses
- Credit for prior learning—district task force
- **Credit by exam**—role of faculty
- Revisit class cancellation policies
- Improve the process/accountability for addressing AI/ plagiarism—reporting, discipline
- Discuss the effect of student housing on campus culture/ (including expanded hours of operation for, e.g. library, other student services
- What is our official policy on overload? At De Anza, overload assignments are based on seniority, with full-time and adjunct faculty ranked similarly according to their years of service.

"What are you worried about?" Some major concerns

Budget

- Effect of cuts on part timer hours/assignments
- Effect on programs—we need to ensure are able to complete in a timely manner at CSM or at least district; consider the effect of any program cuts on student motivation to attend here

Artificial Intelligence

- Do we need a campus committee to address faculty concerns?
- Effects on intellectual property rights—particularly regarding Canvas/Open AI partnering
- "Ghost" student enrollments online—still a problem? What are we doing to address it?
- The gap between online and in-person classes: "impossible" to assess students adequately online?
- We should survey faculty and students about AI use
- Fear that new tech will be adopted without faculty input
- Effects on accreditation if we don't have policies?
- Online classes not being recognized for transfer? (No evidence of this happening yet)
- Students using AI for everything and even wearing META glasses

Dual enrollment

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- Hiring policies
- Evaluation of DE faculty—compensation, workload issues

Concerns about **federal government**

How are we prepping for a **potential attack on the district or CCs generally** from the federal government? What are our vulnerabilities and how can we prepare?

Effects on student population—Latino, international—reduction in attendance? Class cancellations? International students not coming to CSM?
