3. **COURSE DESCRIPTIONS:**

Catalog Description:

Practice in speaking and listening skills, including pronunciation, conversation, note-taking, and vocabulary. Designed for advanced students. Assignments will be tailored to the specific needs of each student. Students work independently at their own pace and meet with an instructor at regular intervals throughout the semester. Students must complete a minimum of 24 hours of work.

3. converse effectively on a variety of topics, using appropriate advanced vocabulary and applying knowledge of English grammar;

6. **COURSE CONTENT:**

Lecture Content:

Lab Content:

The first meeting between the student and the instructor will be focused on developing a semester plan to address the individual needs of the student. The course content may include but is not limited to the following:

1. Pronunciation:
 - A. Pronunciation of specific consonant and vowel sounds
 - B. Pronunciation related to stress and intonation
2. Listening:
 - A. Listening to advanced academic lectures, including building vocabulary through listening activities, listening for specific signal words, listening for main ideas and details
 - B. Using academic lectures to practice note-taking skills
 - C. Understanding colloquial speech as used in television and other shows, including listening for the gist of a conversation and colloquial language (idiomatic language)
3. Speaking:
 - A. Participating in Conversation Circles (an instructor with a small group of students); getting immediate and individualized feedback on pronunciation, grammar, and vocabulary usage
 - B. Doing a presentation, either recorded or in person, including possible self-assessment of the presentation with special attention to language use

7. **REPRESENTATIVE METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:**

Typical methods of instruction may include:

- A. Lecture
- B. Discussion

C. Other (Specify): After discussing with the student their goals and after an evaluation of the student's conversation skills, the instructor will decide the appropriate scope of the work. Teaching strategies may include teaching grammatical structures, assigning appropriate pronunciation exercises so that the student may practice the target sounds, explaining and modeling correct vocabulary usage, assigning listening activities, and participating in conversation circles with the student, and providing feedback regarding problem areas.

Representative assignments in this course may include, but are not limited to the following:

Writing Assignments:

- A. Listen to academic lectures and take notes
- B. Watch a television program and summarize it (either orally or in writing)
- C. Listen to a lecture or television program and write a transcript of 5 minutes of the lecture or program

Other Outside Assignments:

Pronunciation Assignments:

- A. Practice pronunciation trouble spots with pronunciation software

Speaking Assignments:

- A. Participate in Conversation Circles and/or individual meetings with faculty
- B. Practice conversation with Peer Tutors
- C. Record a summary of a television program or lecture
- D. Record a presentation (or do it in real time)
