# **Catalog Description:**

A continuation of MUS 120 Songwriting. Students write and perform original compositions and continue to develop their songwriting skills in writing lyrics, chord progressions and melodies, as well as developing an arrangement.

#### 5. SPECIFIC INSTRUCTIONAL OBJECTIVES:

Upon successful completion of this course, a student will be able to:

- 2. Perform original songs as a soloist or with an ensemble in a public setting
- 3. Develop an arrangement of an original song
- 4. Analyze and critique songs with respect to genre, form, structure, lyrical elements, and arrangement

### **6. COURSE CONTENT:**

#### **Lecture Content:**

This course builds upon the theoretical knowledge studied in MUS 120. Students continue to develop their skills to compose and perform original songs. Specific topics covered may include:

- 1. Theoretical Concepts
  - A. History of songwriting
  - B. Songwriter case studies
  - C. Structure of contemporary songs (form, harmony, rhythm, melody)
  - D. Lyric writing and analysis
  - E. Critical analysis of songs
- 2. Creative Compositional Processes
  - A. Harmonic models and structures
  - B. Composing the melody
  - C. Use of rhythm
  - D. Creating lyrics
  - E. Arrangement
- 3. Performance experience individual and/or ensemble

#### Lab Content:

- 1. Listening and discussion of representative songs related to the themes covered in lecture
- 2. Practical harmony exercises at the keyboard or another instrument use of basic progressions, keys and modes, borrowed chords
- 3. Creative prompts to write melodies and lyrics
- 4. Collaborative work: rehearsing, arranging, and performing
- 5. Class demonstrations/performances including class discussion/critiques
