Lecture Content:

- 1. Music reading how to recognize harmonic, melodic, and rhythmic patterns in more advanced repertoire than in Music 301.
- 2. Functional Harmony/Rhythm Skills more major/minor scales, triadic inversions, introducing compound time, syncopation, etc.
- 3. Piano Technique instruction on the development of finger strength and independence; further study of wrist rotation; more advanced staccato playing, extended 5-finger techniques, etc.

Lab Content:

- 1. Assign Specific Technical Exercises from the Text and Instructor Handouts
- 2. Rapid recognition of intermediate keyboard notation including note values, articulation and dynamics
- 3. Technique
 - A. More hands on practical approaches for successful practice
 - a. mastering the true legato
 - b. more types of staccato playing
 - c. practicing a passage in different keys
 - d. using uneven rhythms in practice
 - B. Good physical habits to form at the keyboard
 - a. additional work for flexibility in the fingers, wrist, forearm and posture
 - C. Dynamic and velocity contrasts resulting from the various forms of touch a. finger, hand, forearm
 - D. Rhythm using a metronome for practice
 - E. Scales practicing scales in various ways; extending scales to two octaves
 - F. Pattern thinking in more complex composition
- 4. Pieces Requiring Two Or More Five-finger Positions thumb-finger and finger-finger substitution
- 5. Exercises in various accompanimental styles
