APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF PRIOR MEETING(S)

Motion to approve the minutes of Monday, February 26, 2024, meeting as presented by Senator Cheng, seconded by Senator Tagashira. Hearing no objections, the motion was carried.

ANNOUNCEMENTS AND HEARING OF THE PUBLIC

REPORTS

In his role as a Mental Health Peer Educator, President Ferreira said that the Love and Wellness Relationship Group that he is organizing will be meeting in Building 5, Room 339 from 2 pm to 3 pm starting March 7.

Student Trustee Arthur Veloso reported that at its last meeting, the Board of Trustees voted to increase the non-resident tuition fee by 2.5% for the 2024-2025 academic year, which will raise the fee by \$9 per unit. This increase is mandated by the California Education Code. The Board adopted the smallest increase it could under the law. Board President John Pimentel did put forward a proposal to tack on a \$77 per unit Capital Outlay Fee, but that was rejected by the other trustees. Student Trustee Veloso asked members of the student government to let the Board of Trustees know about the real-world impact of tuition increases.

Vice President Shive mentioned that the Board of Trustees has adopted a change to the election process for student trustee. She asked Student Trustee Veloso if he was aware of the change and if he had any additional information. Student Trustee Veloso said that he is not familiar with the change, but that he will be researching the matter and bringing back more information. Mr. Schaefer noted that the revised Board Policy was adopted in November 2023.

Senator Ferreira said that she sent a survey to members of the Senate regarding the refurbishment of the ASCSM Office and only one person responded. She will be resending the link and asked everyone to provide feedback.

Senator Tagashira reported that the Committee on Teaching and Learning discussed how faculty can be trained to use the Canvas platform more effectively.

Interim Vice President of Student Services Alex Guiriba said that the College has extended an invitation to alumnus Lori Chen to be this year's Commencement keynote speaker. Ms. Chen was involved with the Associated Students and was a founding member of the Psychology Club. Ms. Chen is currently finishing her Master's and Doctorate in Clinical Psychology.

Mr. Guiriba also said that nominations for the Campus Life and Leadership Awards are due by Friday, March 15. The awards will be presented on Thursday, April 26, in the Bayview Dining Room in Buildin 10.

Student Life and Leadership Manager Aaron Schaefer encouraged folks to submit nominations for the Campus Life and Leadership Awards. He said that no one should assume that someone they feel deserves the award will automatically be nominated.

Student Life and Leadership Staff Assistant Mondana Bathai said that the planning committee is looking for student performers for the Campus Life and Leadership Awards Ceremony. Anyone interested should contact Ms. Bathai directly.

REPORTS.

Vice President Shive said that the ASCSM Recruitment Event will be taking place this Wednesday. She encouraged members of the Senate to participate.

Student Trustee Veloso noted that the first ever Queer Students of Color Conference would be taking place at Skyline College on Friday, March 8 from 9 am to 2:30 pm. Mr. Veloso said that the conference is part of his work to establish a Pride Center. As a follow-up to the question during the last meeting about the process for electing the student trustee, Mr. Veloso said he spoke with the interim chancellor about the matter. The decision has been made to reinstate the current process while seeking input from county counsel and Student Life staff in the District.

Interim Vice President of Student Services Guiriba said that he will be attending the Chief Student Services Officers Conference this week. Mr. Guiriba said that during spring recess the departments that usually have evening hours won't be open late. He also mentioned that the campus will be closed on Friday, March 29 in observance of Cesar Chavez Day.

Interim Vice President Guiriba reported that 37 students applied to attend the Asian Pacific Americans in Higher Education (APAHE) Conference. In addition, the National Conference on Race and Ethnicity (NCORE) will be taking place in late May in Hawaii. Mr. Guiriba said the Senate may want to consider sending some students to NCORE. He also said that work to pay students for time spent serving on committees is progressing. Finally, Mr. Guiriba announced that the video interviews of the finalists for District Chancellor would be made available Friday afternoon for feedback.

Student Life and Leadership Manager Aaron Schaefer said that the district is in the process of updating and aligning Board Policies and Administrative Procedures. Because of this, the Board adopted language that changes the way in which the student trustee is selected. Rather than having District Student Council (DSC) select from among the three campus nominees, the new language would require a districtwide election of all students. This creates challenges and inequities due to travel requirements and the size of CSM and Skyline when compared with Cañada. The district Student Life staff alerted the Chancellor's Office about this. For now, the previous process has been restored and will be used to select the student trustee for 2024-2025. The district will be seeking input from county counsel and Student Life staff before moving forward.

Mr. Schaefer announced Michelle Lopez Grijalva resigned her position as senator. If anyone has a recommendation for an appointment to fill this vacancy should forward the name to President Ferreira and Vice President Shive.

Student Life and Leadership Staff Assistant Mondana Bathai reminded the group that nominations for the Campus Life and Leadership Awards are due by Friday, March 15.

College of San Mateo Classified Senate Resolution on Terminology changes regarding Academic Standing

Whereas, the term *academic probation*, when used in higher education, has historically indicated a "deficit" regarding the student and the term *probation* is associated with criminal activity and can perpetuate trauma for students who identify as Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) as well as justice-impacted students; and

Whereas, College of San Mateo's Mission, Vision and Values statements and Institutional Priorities emphasize that our college and district embrace inclusivity and work to dismantle systems of oppression; and

Whereas, the term *Academic Notice* carries the same meaning institutionally as Academic Probation and relays the information that the student needs to be aware and take action, but it is not punitive and does not invoke criminality; and

Whereas, the <u>Academic Senate for California Community Colleges is currently promoting change</u> of the Title 5 language around probation and dismissal;

Resolved, that the Classified Senate of College of San Mateo supports the District-wide modification of terminology around probation to include a name change to "Academic Notice" thus keeping the language and processes assetminded, not punitive; and

Resolved, that the Classified Senate of College of San Mateo encourages the review of local policies and practices to adjust any that may negatively impact students who are on academic probation; and

Resolved, That the Classified Senate of College of San Mateo work with the Classified Senate for California Community Colleges (4CS) to voice support for the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges and work hand in hand with them to encourage the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office to overhaul the Title 5 language on probation including a name change and updating the language and processes to be asset-minded, not punitive.

Background Information:

The term "academic probation" is used in higher education and has been used historically to indicate a "deficit" in students (Barouch-Gilbert, 2022).

Students at San Mateo County Community College District, who fall below a 2.0 cumulative grade point average and/or have completed less than 51% of all attempted units are placed on **academic probation or dismissal status.**

- Probation 1 First semester not meeting good standing criteria
- Probation 2 Second semester not meeting good standing criteria
- Dismissal Third semester not meeting good standing criteria

Proposal:

- Change the terminology regarding students out of good academic standing.
 - Probation will become "Academic Notice"
 - o Academic Notice 1
 - Academic Notice 2
- Dismissal will be changed to a different term we are still working on research and discovery of an appropriate term.

Rationale:

As a District that embraces inclusivity and works to dismantle systems of oppressions, changing this terminology will support students as they work to succeed, rather than making them feel isolated and dejected.

The term *Academic Notice* carries the same meaning institutionally and relays the information that the student needs to be aware and take action, but it is not punitive and does not induce stigma or invoke a sense of criminality, as the term *probation* may.

The ASCCC is currently working to change the Title 5 language around probation and dismissal, and we concur.

The Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) Leadership Development Program is a pioneering student organization that trains AAPI student leaders to lead culturally inclusive storytelling, activities, and advocacy. Representation for AAPI communities is essential to highlight for various reasons such as increasing campus inclusivity, shedding light on Anti-Asian Hate, and dismantling the idea that the AAPI community is a monolith. AAPI are often perceived as highly educated "model minorities". This harmful generalization obscures significant differences that exist between diverse groups within the demographic category. As of the 2022-2023 academic year, Asian students made up 19.10% of the district's student body, while Pacific Islander students made up 1.50% of the district's student body.

We aim to shed light on key demographic characteristics of Asian American, Native Hawaiian, and Pacific Islander populations disaggregated by race, detailed origin, and geography as presented by AAPI Data's "National State of Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders in the United States" (2022) and their joint research with UCLA's Center Health Policy Research "Piecing the Puzzle of AANHPI Mental Health" (2024). Highlights would include population changes, geography, immigration, language use and language proficiency, educational attainment, occupational differences, poverty, mental health, housing, health and social safety net, and public opinion and voting.

During AAPI Heritage Month and Mental Health Awareness Month (May), our upcoming event aims to highlight diverse AAPI cultures through food and a symbolic "passport" system. In combination with various College of San Mateo student clubs and local AAPI owned businesses, foods from 8 different AAPI cultures will be served in sample sizes to the student body. The foods from these communities are meant to bring the CSM community together and also attract them to our research boards that will have an accompanying AAPILD program fellow. The educational aspect will be accomplished through informational posters accompanying each type of food. It is our deepest hope that this event provides diverse representation, in terms of the heritage and pride of AAPI communities, to CSM.
