### CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 2:17 p.m.

### ROLL CALL

### APPROVAL OF THE AGENDA

Motion to approve the agenda as presented by Vice Chair Paing; seconded by Senator Martin. Hearing no objections, the motion carried.

### APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES OF PRIOR MEETING(S)

Motion to approve the minutes of the Monday, February 11, 2019 meeting by Senator Gaines; seconded by Senator King. Hearing no objections, the motion carried.

### ANNOUNCEMENTS AND HEARING OF THE PUBLIC

None.

### REPORTS

Vice President Giari introduced new Board of Trustees member, Thomas Nuris to the Senate; Mr. Nuris was newly elected to the Board in November and is from Daly City. He has indicated his excitement towards the work that student government conducts, and hopes to work more with ASCSM in the future. Ms. Giari told the Senate that the District Student Council Mixer would be held on Friday, March 22<sup>nd</sup>.

Finance Director Burrighr recounted his attendance of the recent District Committee on Budget & Finance, noting that members were working towards making surplus funds more transparent to the SMCCD community. Mr. Burrighr also remarked that the committee discussed allocation of auxiliary funds, as well as funds regarding the new furniture to be placed in Building 10.

Secretary Chavez reminded members of the Senate to be respectful of those bringing their funding proposals or presentations to meetings.

Senator Taylor reported on the recent Equity Committee meeting, explaining that the committee would be holding off on drafting an improved equity plan. Ms. Taylor also conveyed that the committee had discussed the impact of AB 705 on the English and Mathematics Departments.

Senator Nava told the Senate that Sustainability Committee had begun planning for the Earth Day Job Fair on April 22<sup>nd</sup>. She also stated that there would be a planting party for the CSM Cesar Chavez Community Garden next month. Ms. Nava announced that the library's Makerspace was hosting an event where students could create their own hydroponic plants.

Senator Perrilliat informed the Senate that the Programming Board would be having a St. Patrick's Day event on Monday, March 18<sup>th</sup>. The Board would also be planning events for Earth Day and for Spring Fling, both in April.

Student Life and Leadership Manager Schaefer reported that Skyline's AS advisor had extended apologies over the circumstances of the District Student Council Mixer. Mr. Schaefer encouraged members of the Senate to consider running in the election for CSM's Student Trustee Nominee, acknowledging that the requirements were highly similar to that of a student running for the ASCSM General Election. Those interested in running for Student Trustee Nominee should have a general understanding of how the College operates, with some prior experience in collaborating with different on-campus groups. Mr. Schaefer insisted that members staying at CSM for the following academic year give thought to re-running for the ASCSM General Election this spring.

Student Life and Leadership Assistant Hamadeh apologized for his absence the prior week, citing a rough case of food poisoning. Mr. Hamadeh expressed his gratitude for the group's patience, assistance, and perseverance during his time heading the Student Life Center; in particular, he thanked student assistants Gaby, Mary, and Jordan for their help.

Motion to approve the appointment by Senator Langi; seconded by Senator Gaines. Hearing no objections, the motion carried.

## LEGISLATIVE BILLS

On behalf of the Advocacy Board, Legislative Coordinator Amanda Janks forwarded the following legislative bills and recommendations:

- **S.66 — Assault Weapons Ban of 2019**  
The purpose of this bill is to regulate semiautomatic/automatic firearms, allowing for more stringent distribution, manufacturing, and sale of such weapons. As a result, more interstate regulations will be placed on those who carry these kinds of weapons across states. S.66 names 205 banned weapons and lists over 2000 useable weapons; this bill also calls for mandatory background checks on those purchasing these particular firearms.

Recommendation from the Advocacy Board: Support

Motion to support S.66 Assault Weapons Ban of 2019 by Senator Langi; seconded by Senator Graciarena.

Ms. Janks insisted that the Senate support this bill due to the prevalence of gun violence in the United States, especially within schools; it is a valid fear that should be addressed due to the urgency of such situations. Senator Martin expressed concern over supporting the bill, noting that such regulations might not be enough to effectively protect individuals. Senator King insisted that the Senate support S.66, emphasizing its pertinence to students; she indicated that showing support for the bill would set precedent for protection of future generations of students.

By a vote of 12 in favor, 1 opposed, and 1 abstaining, the motion carried.

- **S. 96 — Safe and Affordable Drug Importation Act**  
The purpose of this bill is to allow for the importation of safe and affordable drugs by wholesale distributors, pharmacies, and individuals, thus allowing for more competition within the highly monopolized pharmaceutical industry.

Recommendation from the Advocacy Board: Support

Motion to support S.96 Safe and Affordable Drug Importation Act by Senator Gaines; seconded by Senator Taylor.

Ms. Janks recommended supporting S.96 due to its fiscal impact on people with chronic illness or disabilities; this includes students who may not be able afford prescribed drugs at the their given prices. She argued that, because students already have tuition to worry about, they should at least be able to afford more crucial necessities such as medicine.

By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

- **S.102 Prescription Drug Relief Act of 2019**

Similarly to S.96, the purpose of this bill is to significantly lower prices for prescription drugs in the United States by ending government-granted monopolies on such necessities. This bill would require that drug prices be compared to median prices across the globe.

Recommendation from the Advocacy Board: Support

Motion to support S.102 Prescription Drug Relief Act of 2019 by Senator Martin; seconded by Senator Graciarena. By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

## **DEBRIEF OF ASCSM EVENTS**

- **Spring 2019 Club Fair**

Vice Chair Paing thanked members for their dedication to the Spring 2019 Club Fair, which took place on Wednesday, February 20<sup>th</sup>, and Thursday, the 21<sup>st</sup>. Although there were several setbacks regarding food and facilities, the event went relatively well. Mr. Paing indicated that not many clubs had participated and promoted during the event. Advisor Hamadeh remarked that set-up on the first day of the event had not been done by facilities, thus forcing Club Fair to be pushed back a day.

## **FUNDING TO ATTEND SPRING 2019 AGS STATEWIDE CONVENTION**

The proposed total budget for this trip, \$3,500.00, was amended to \$1,500.00, and thus, the following item, Item b. "Additional Funding to Attend Spring 2019 AGS Statewide Convention" was discontinued. This spring, from April 5<sup>th</sup> to April 7<sup>th</sup>, Alpha Gamma Sigma Eta Chapter will be attending the annual AGS Spring Convention; this year, the conference will be held in Anaheim. The weekend of the convention will include workshops and other educational activities to help attendees learn new leadership, communication, academic, and volunteer skills. Senator King, president of AGS at CSM, brought forth the proposal to the Senate, stating that all attendees had applied for scholarships to attend the convention. Members who had expressed prior dedication and willingness to truly learn during the convention were considered for the trip. Ms. King noted that much work had been done to make attendance of the convention possible; funds had been acquired from the President's Office, and also from each attendee. The proposed \$1,500.00 would account for convention registration, transportation, and lodging.

Motion to approve \$1,500.00 from the 5031 Club Assistance/ICC Account to fund AGS Eta Chapter's attendance of the Spring 2019 AGS Statewide Convention by Senator Taylor; seconded by Senator Perrilliat. By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

## **ADDITIONAL FUNDING FOR SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA UNIVERSITY TOUR**

From the prior proposal, Transfer Club requested an additional \$1,000.00 to fund their annual tour of several Southern California universities, including Cal Poly, UCLA, UCSD, UCSB, and SDSU. This tour will take over the course of three days during Spring Break, from April 1<sup>st</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup>. This would bring total funding for the Southern California University Tour to \$2,500.00.

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Motion to approve an additional \$1,000.00 from the 5031 Club Assistance/ICC Account to fund the Southern California University Tour by Vice Chair Paing; seconded by Senator Nava. By a vote of 14 in favor, 0 opposed, and 0 abstaining, the motion carried.

### **REVIEW OF INSTITUTIONAL SELF-EVALUATION REPORTS**

Because CSM will be having its accreditation visit this year starting September 30<sup>th</sup>, the college must prepare their institutional self-evaluation report. Professor Madeline Murphy of the English Department has devoted much time to drafting a several-hundred page report for accreditation. Advisor Hamadeh presented a document listing the four standards of the institutional self-evaluation report. These standards include Standard I: Mission, Academic Quality, Institutional Effectiveness, & Integrity, Standard II: Student Learning Programs & Support Services, Standard III: Resources, and Standard IV: Leadership & Governance. Under each standard, a multitude of themes will be covered in the report. The Senate was encouraged to review this document, and to later on, skim through the institutional self-evaluation report for glaring concerns.

The Secretary shall provide child care assistance to an eligible veteran for any period that the veteran—receives covered health care services at a facility of the Department, such as a community-based outpatient clinic; and is required to travel to and return from such facility for the receipt of such health care services.

Child care assistance for veterans receiving mental health care and other intensive health care services. Subject to subsection, child care assistance provided under this section may include any of the following: A stipend for the payment of child care offered by a licensed child care center or extended day program (either directly or through a voucher program) which shall be, to the extent practicable, modeled after the Department of Veterans Affairs Child Care Subsidy Program established pursuant to section 590 of title 40. A payment made directly to a private child care agency. The Secretary shall submit to Congress an annual report on the provision of child care assistance under this section. Each such report shall include, for the year covered by the report, each of the following for each of the categories of child care assistance specified in paragraph: The average amount of time required by the Department to provide a payment for child care assistance. The average

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cost of child care assistance. The extent to which the Department has a backlog of unprocessed claims for child care assistance.

**Bill Description**

The idea of the bill is affirm that declaration of war is necessary and approved by congress before arbitrarily being carried out. AUMF was a law passed Sept. 14, 2001 as a response to 9/11 to allow for military action against anybody suspected of having an affiliation with terrorist organizations. AUMF is the justification for our 17-yr long presence in Afghanistan and Iraq. This bill recognizes that our objectives now differ from then, and that AUMF has essentially aged badly; it's outdated, discredited, and irrelevant. By attacking/maintaining presence in countries where 90% of resulting casualties are civilians, we don't fight terrorism, but we certainly make enemies.

**Recommended Stance and Justification**

This bill is solid--topical, peaceful, and bipartisan (named after a R. representative + the first cosponsor was a conservative legislator from NC). We should watch it since being an anti-war student has always been badass.
