Ask the Doctor: COVID-19 vs. The Flu

This ongoing feature addresses common student health questions, answered by CSM College Physician Dr. Jennifer Yang.

DEAR DOC: How can I tell if I have Covid-19 or just the regular flu? -Sniffling in San Mateo

DEAR SNIFFLING: COVID-19 and the flu have many symptoms in common, and it can be tough to distinguish the two. Both types of viruses can give you fever, cough, shortness of breath, fatigue, body aches, headaches, runny nose, nausea, diarrhea, among others. Some people with COVID-19 infections have reported losing their sense of smell or taste. While more is learned every day about COVID-19, there is still much that is unknown. The best way to tell if you have COVID-19 or influenza (flu) is to get tested. Find where you can get free COVID-19 testing in San Mateo County at https://www.smcgov.org/testing

San Mateo County Community College District's (SMCCCD) 2020 Annual Security Report (ASR), required by the Clery Act, includes statistics for the previous three years concerning reported crimes that occurred on campus; in certain off-campus buildings owned or controlled by SMCCCD; and on public property within, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from SMCCCD. Our 2020 Annual Security Report also outlines various campus safety and security policies, such as those concerning crime reporting, prevention and response to sexual and gender violence, alcohol and drug use, crime



prevention, emergency response and evacuation procedures, and other matters. The 2020 Annual Security Report also includes important tips to help every member of the community remain safe and avoid becoming a victim of crime.
