Writing in the End Zone (WITEZ)

The program was formed in 2002 to focus on the lowest achieving students in CSM. WITEZ, which requires collaboration between the English and athletic departments, aims to assist the African-American and Pacific Islander students groups in developing English writing and math skills by creating a supportive and engaging learning environment, using learning materials that students can relate to, and focusing on process and applied skills. Admission and Records also assists the program by helping students with registration and transfer requirements. (See program handout)

Accreditation Update
